Injured in Fall.

B. B. Nutter, Pendleton resident, was injured Saturday when he lost his balance while working on a ladder. He was precipitated to the ground. His wrist was sprained, and he was otherwise bruised with the result that he will be confined to his home for several days.

War Baby in Hospital

Little Robert Pershing Ingalls, son of Mrs. Robert Ingalls, is a patient in St. Anthony's hospital where he is convalescing nicely after having his tonsils and adenoids removed. The boy is a year baby and was born after his father, the late Robert Ingalls, was killed in the Argonne battlefield.

Undergoes Operation.

Mrs. William Chief of Meacham was brought to St. Anthony's hospital early Sunday morning where she underwent an operation for appendicitis. She is getting along very nicely, according to reports from the hospital.

Rev. and Mrs. Snyder Hurt

Rev. and Mrs. J. E. Snyder, of Corvallis, formerly of Pendleton, suffered injuries in an automobile accident recently at Camp Sherman, on the Metolius river. Rev. and Mrs. Snyder were starting home in the machine when Rev. Snyder turned to wave good-bye to his friends in the camp. He lost control of the machine which ran into a tree four feet in diameter. Mrs. Snyder suffered a cut in her upper lip and four stitches were used in closing the wound, while Rev. Snyder was badly bruised. The axle of the machine was broken and the car was seriously damaged. Rev. Snyder was formerly pastor of the Presbyterian church here and now is pastor at Corvallis.

Elmer Moore reports that he has finished harvesting his 2999 acres of wheat. The yield on the whole was very satisfactory.

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To Start Road Work.

Bankhouse Burns

Fire of an unknown origin destroyed a bankhouse and blacksmith shop on the farm of Frank Curl on the reservation. The fire was discovered at 11 o'clock this morning, and efforts to extinguish it were in vain. Some insurance on the buildings was carried, but the amount of the loss was not known.

Has Leg Broken

Ray P. Hutsell, 319 Cosbie street, suffered a fracture of the left leg this morning about 8:30 o'clock at the railroad shops at Rieth. His leg was caught under some machinery that fell, according to a report. Immediately after the accident he was rushed to St. Anthony's hospital in a car that was taken from the yards, and medical aid was given. He is married and has two children.

The Cunningham Sheep Co., the largest Rambouillet sheep plant in the world, is making arrangements to ship 200 head of Rambouillet and cross-bred rams to the Salt Lake Ram Sale August 29, 30 and 31. Mac Hoke, secretary of the company, says that the animals are exceptionally fine. They are being trimmed and made ready for the trip and will be shipped August 24.

Many of the passengers were bruised and cut as a result of the collision, according to Mr. Coffman, but there were no serious injuries. Mr. and Mrs. Coffman will leave tomorrow for Meacham where they will spend a few days in the hills.

Deer Is Plentiful

That deer hunting this fall will be excellent in Umatilla county is the belief of sportsmen who have been in the hills and mountains during the past two or three weeks. Huckleberry gatherers have reported seeing deer in large numbers. Sunday Dan Bowman saw four bucks. Reports from other sportsmen brought the number seen yesterday up to nine, six of this number being bucks and three does. Grouse and pheasants are also plentiful in some localities. The deer season does not open until September 1. At that time the nitrods will also have the privilege of going after grouse and pheasants.

Weather Very Warm

Although the maximum temperature today is only 83, 12 degrees less than yesterday, the humidity is noticeable and the weather is apparently much warmer than that experienced in Pendleton during the past few days. Last night was exceedingly warm, the mercury falling no lower than 69. Today the barometer registers 29.45 and is falling. Major Lee Moorhouse, weather observer, says that a storm may be expected tonight. A dust storm this morning brought no rain. Farmers are hoping that the weather will remain fair until harvest is finished a week hence.
