WOMAN FIGHTS VIVISECTION
 DENVER, Aug. 8.—(U. N. S.)—Colorado's animals will breathe easier and enjoy more freedom if Mrs. Leonard L. Hall, attaché of the State Bureau of Child and Animal Protection, has her way.
 Sending representatives into every county of the State to preach against vivisection, Mrs. Hall hopes to so enlighten the public that by the time the next Legislature is convening enough pressure can be brought to bear to insure the passage of a law making vivisection illegal in Colorado.
 "If the public can be informed between now and the next general election as to what vivisection really is and means," said Mrs. Hall, "I believe an anti-vivisection bill will be carried to 17."
 Mrs. Hall is thoroughly equipped with medical opinion in support of her movement.

SECRET TEST OF DELIVERY DEPARTMENT OF POST OFFICE PROVES DELIVERY OF GOODS
 WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—(U. N. S.)—If there is anything wrong with the postal service we want to know it. That is the message Postmaster General Will Hays has sent out to the thousands of postmasters throughout the country. "If there is anything wrong let's make the postal service for it, because they will do better work if we do this," said Hays.
 Reports reaching the post office department indicate that the postal workers are making excellent records in handling mail. This is shown by a secret test of parcel post shipments made by a big mail order house to six hundred widely scattered points. The test was conducted without knowledge of anyone in the postal service and the result showed that all the packages practically reached their destinations as quickly as letter mail.

 TEXARKANA, APR., Aug. 8.—Do-Do Highwater, fourteen-year-old "kidnapped kidnap-er," refused to have his love recalled. Likewise, he refused to relinquish his twenty-one-year-old bride of a day despite announcement pronouncements of a court.
 Following an alleged attempt at suicide, because his parents objected to his choice, the boy went to the home of Bertha Gimes. They were married. The new bride was taken into custody, charged with kidnaping and entrapment of a minor. Date for her trial has not been set.
 "I have absolutely nothing to say," declared Miss Gimes today. "My nature? Well, of all the nerve, I should say not."
 "It's a dirty shame for the newspapers to print things about my marriage!" she declared, with violent indignation.
 That the marriage was blood confirmed by County Attorney Henry Gimes, who said the kidnaping was held in restraint by his parents, pending his promise to go back to school and forget his "innocent love!"

CURE FOR DIVORCE.
 GENEVA, Aug. 8.—All Swiss girls will be compelled to take a one-year course in household and cooking if a measure about to be introduced in the Swiss parliament is passed. Advocates of the measure say they can produce statistics to show that girls who have taken the domestic science course marry more readily and are less apt to appear in the divorce court than their idle sisters.

BRITISH PREMIER MAY NOT ATTEND CONFERENCE
 PARIS, Aug. 8.—(U. N. S.)—British Premier Lloyd George told the United Press he would not attend the Washington disarmament conference. The personnel of the British delegation is undecided.
 Two girls beat an octopus to death at Barrow, California, when the creature seized in its tentacles the eight-year-old brother of the girls. Using oars, beyond-fishing, the girls partly skinned the animal, which loosened the hold on the boy and crawled to near-by rocks, where it was beaten to death.
