NATIONAL CHAPLAIN OF AMERICAN LEGION OFFERS TO MARRY LEGIONNAIRES FREE OF CHARGE DURING KANSAS CITY CONVENTION

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Because he believes that marriage of the right sort is the best thing that can happen to a worthy ex-service man, the Rev. John W. Inzer, national chaplain of the American Legion, has offered to marry without cost all legion men who visit the third annual national convention of the organization at Kansas City, October 21, November 1 and 2.

The legion chaplain's offer was made in a letter received today by Albert E. Hutchings, convention executive committee chairman. In furtherance of Rev. Inzer's project, convention officials announced that all expenses for marriage licenses would be paid by the convention executive committee.

The Rev. Inzer, who is pastor of the First Baptist Church at Chattanooga, Tenn., explains his offer in the following letter:

"Recently a splendid young ex-service man from an Eastern city came here with his bride to be married by the national chaplain. I call this legion loyalty. The thought has come to some of us that there are a number of fellows who might like to be married at the convention by the national chaplain. It would have a touch of romance about it surely. I shall be glad to perform ceremonies absolutely free of charge for all ex-service men and their brides during the period of the convention. Of course, I would expect any one who had been divorced to show a Scriptural cause for same. I am a firm believer in marriage

—one man to one wife. A married ex-service man has more to live for—becomes a better citizen and, as a rule, a much better man. As some one has said: His sacrifices for his country have made him intensely patriotic and the acquisition of a home and family will eliminate that vague feeling of wanderlust and restlessness which has troubled so many veterans of the World War since their discharge from the service. It will not bother me to be kept busy half the time if I am marrying real legion lovers to the finest little girl in the world."

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—Joseph Henderson told the police yesterday his side of the story regarding the killing of his divorced wife, for which authorities are holding him for first degree murder. Henderson is slowly recovering from his self-inflicted wounds when he shot himself following his attack on his wife. He declared he had no intention of harming his wife when he visited her. He wanted to effect a reconciliation. He carried a pistol for fear of his wife's father, who, he declared, had threatened to shoot his "son right."

SWALLOWS MERCURY TABLETS AND DIES

POCATELLO, Ida., Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—Genevieve Burns, died from swallowing 12 bichloride mercury tablets last Friday. She told her mother, Dr. Blakemore, a local dentist, was responsible for her act. Blakemore, held on a charge of assault with intent to kill, will probably be charged with murder, according to the district attorney.

DISCREPANCIES ARE BROUGHT TO LIGHT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—(U. N. S.)—The announcement that a regular inspection of the books of a subordinate officer of the Red Cross "brought to light certain discrepancies," was made by Chairman Livingston, of the central committee of Red Cross.

The stated amount involved will not exceed \$100,000 and is covered by a surety bond.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—(U. N. S.)—When Chicago's New Woman's Band gave its initial concert recently there were four persons in the audience who knew that the pretty little girl who gave a xylophone solo was Olive-belle Hamon, daughter of the late Jake L. Hamon, killed by Clara Hamon, whose act, subsequent flight, capture and trial were a national sensation.

Olive-belle, who is only eleven years old, is a musical prodigy. In addition to playing the xylophone, she is an accomplished violinist and piano drummer. She is the best of the twenty-five drummers in the band, according to the director.

Mrs. Hamon, wife of the late oil millionaire and national republican committeeman from Oklahoma, is living in Chicago now for the sole purpose of educating her daughter in music. Olive-belle is studying the violin at the Chicago College of Music, which numbers 200 pieces when that organization led the parade opening Chicago's Pageant of Progress.

NO TRACE OF PRISONERS

PORT ORCHARD, Wash., Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—There is no trace of Henry Brandner and Earl Newburn, prisoners who made their getaway when they threw pepper in the jailer's eyes, escaped his keys and a revolver and fled in the jailer's automobile. Prisons are scouring the district, although Sheriff Feln expresses his belief that the men are heading for Canada.
