- Do not use galvanized or chip-ped enamel utensils in making preserves, jellies, or fruit juices.
- Some of the zinc with which the vessels are galvanized may be chipped off by the acid and will give the product an acid and astringent taste and render it unsuitable for human use. Moreover, the dissolving of this zinc coating tends to ruin the container. The use of galvanized utensils for boiling down fruit juice is especially risky.

ADVENTURE SEEKER TO RETURN TO SOUTH SEAS

COLFAX, Ia., Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—The south seas are beckoning James Norman Hall.

Iowa's vagrant author, famous from his war books, "Kitchener's Mob," and "High Adventure," who has spent the last eighteen months roaming between Tahiti and the Marquesas Islands in the eastern ocean, is now visiting his parents here, but the romantic charm of the palm isles will draw him back within the next three months.

Jogging along with his companion, Charles Nordhoff, Hall has completed a set of articles on the "Fairy Islands of Seas," which have been published in an eastern magazine and will appear in book form next winter.

The famous chronicler of the Lafayette expedition, who joined "Kitchener's Mob" in 1914 has journeyed more than 7000 miles in the last year within the islands. His next trip will be to Rapa, a rarely visited islet 500 miles south of Tahiti, down next to the Equator.

"The romance and charm of the islands is justified," Hall declares. "The black sands, luxurious vegetation and bright blue skies make them beautiful.

"The natives are fine, broad-shouldered, splendid specimens. The women are not, perhaps as beautiful as they are reputed to be in fiction."

"Often my companion and I stay for weeks on a tiny atoll—a little, low is-

land with coconut trees surrounding a lagoon, not more than three feet above the ocean.

"One finds romance everywhere."

The debonair author is unmarried but he's returning to the south seas.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—(U. N. S.)—The house passed a bill imposing a flat 90 percent ad valorem tax on American-made goods sold abroad and brought back as imports to be sold in this country. The purpose of the bill is to shut off from the American markets vast stores of war supplies sold abroad by the United States war department at the close of the late war.
