CONVENTION IS SUCCESS

The Women's Christian Temperance Union forty-eighth national convention, now in session in San Francisco, is most successful and instructive, according to word received by local white ribbon crusaders from Mrs. A. E. May, delegate from the Umatilla county union, and Mrs. Mary Hatch, delegate from Pendleton's union.

The convention, the state is being held in the great civic auditorium of San Francisco. The convention is the first since prohibition went into effect and as such marks a new era

in the W. C. T. U. Prohibition enforcement is being stressed and world prohibition prospects reviewed on a large scale. Other lines of women's betterment are being developed at the convention.

The Pendleton women state that the convention in San Francisco recalls to the minds of the delegates the fact that it was in San Francisco that the idea of the world's W. C. T. U. was born. While visiting Chinatown 28 years ago Miss Frances E. Willard, founder of the W. C. T. U., was so impressed with the sight of young Chi-

nese girls brought there for immoral purposes that she declared the mothers of the world must be organized to prevent such practices.

The world's W. C. T. U., which developed from her resolve of that moment, numbers a million members today and is organized in nearly 40 countries.

Gordon, Mrs. Ella Boole, vice-president-at-large, Brooklyn; Mrs. Frances I. Parks, corresponding secretary from national headquarters at Evanston, Ill.; Mrs. Elizabeth Preston Anderson, recording secretary, Fargo, N. D.; Mrs. Sara H. Hoge, assistant recording secretary, Lincoln, Va.; Mrs. Margaret C. Munns, national treasurer, of Evanston and notable group of directors and superintendents of W. C. T. U. work including Mrs. Elizabeth A. Perkins, director of child welfare; Mrs. Culla J. Hayhinger, director of the Americanization work; Miss Bertha R. Bowman, national publicity director, and Mrs. Mary Harris Armour of Georgia.

Mrs. May after a visit in Los Angeles with Mrs. Gideon Brown, will return to Pendleton, but Mrs. Hatch will remain in California with her son and daughter.

IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES HOME DEMONSTRATION

- * Late summer is not too late to preserve eggs, but care must be taken that they are strictly fresh.
- * Two methods of preserving eggs are recommended.
- * **Water-glass Method**
- * Use 1 quart of sodium silicate to 9 quarts of water that has been boiled and cooled. Place the mixture in a 5-gallon crock or jar. This will be sufficient to preserve 15 dozen. Be very careful to allow at least 2 inches of the solution to cover the eggs.
- * Place the crock containing the preserved eggs in a cool, dry place, well covered to prevent evaporation.
- * **Lime Method**
- * Dissolve 2 or 3 pounds of unslaked lime in 5 gallons of water that has previously been boiled and allowed to cool, and allow the mixture to stand until the lime settles and the liquid is clear.

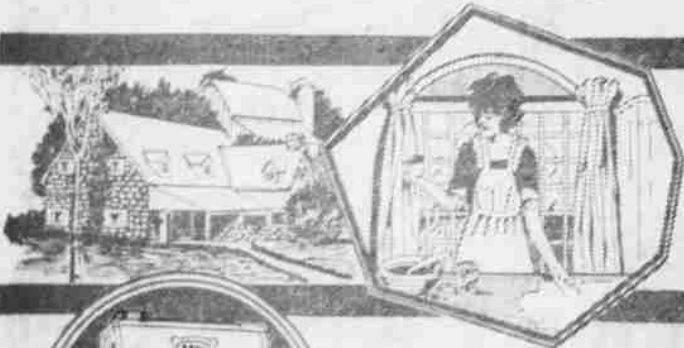

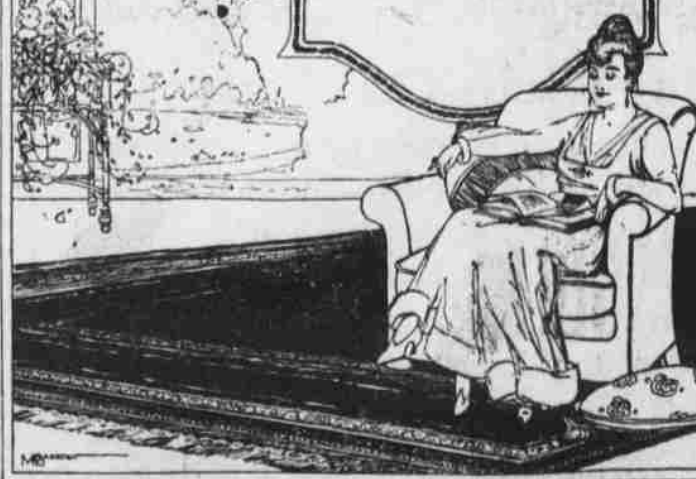
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
