- Pressing Hints.
- When pressing women garments use a moderately hot iron.
- Cover the right side of the garment with a rather heavy pressing cloth, wring out dry. Press until the cloth is dry, then turn the garment and press on the wrong side. A piece of black sateen makes an excellent pressing cloth for dark garments, because it leaves no lint.—E. W. D.
