**Need Parking Space**  
 One of the biggest problems Pendleton will have to face this year during the Round-Up will be the providing of sufficient parking space for cars for visitors. Indications are that a larger portion of the crowd than ever before

will make the trip here in cars. Heretofore, the task of providing room with proper accommodations for these machines has been no slight one, and it is probable that this year it will be more difficult than ever. It is likely that the city will be asked to assist in the problem.

**Add Men to Force.**  
 Two men from out of town have recently been added to the force of salesmen at Bond Bros. W. Elvin Lantis, formerly with C. P. Bishop & Co. of Salem, is the most recent arrival. He and Mrs. Lantis arrived in Pendleton yesterday. Their wedding was an event of a fortnight ago. H. D. Fordyce, formerly of Twin Falls, Idaho, is another newcomer. Mrs. Fordyce and the children have not yet come to Pendleton, but they will move as quickly as a place to live can be secured.

**Returns to Mountains**  
 J. C. Kuhns, Umatilla forest supervisor, who was in Pendleton Saturday, returned Sunday to the mountains where he is supervising the construction of the Ruckle Road-Mt. Emily telephone line. Later he will supervise the Dry Gulch-Tucanone telephone line. Both are new telephone lines and will be a decided improvement for the forest.

**Good Results Obtained**  
 The making of fly traps, fireless cookers and dress forms, and the demonstration of pressure cookers, was the program for a meeting of Ukiah women Saturday afternoon under the direction of Mrs. Edith G. Van Deusen, home demonstration agent. Mrs. Van Deusen states that the women of Ukiah showed a marked interest in the work and have asked for a millinery school later, which Mrs. Van Deusen will hold.

**George Hartman Chosen**  
 George Hartman, mayor of Pendleton, has been chosen by Governor Ben W. Olcott to represent Umatilla county at a conference to be held in Portland September 8 to devise plans for financing the Portland exposition in 1925. Members of the committee, during the recent war, were chairmen of the liberty loan committees of their various counties. In the delegations representing the counties the old liberty loan campaign machinery will be revived as the framework of a new financing machine. So far as possible the men who served as county chairmen of the liberty loan organization will be selected as the delegates. Governor Olcott has asked that three delegates from the state at large be named from the state editorial association, the state chamber of commerce, the farmers' union, the state grange, the taxpayers' league and the county judges' association.

**May Make Survey**  
 It is probable that next year R. S. Washburn, agriculturist of the farm management of the United States department of agriculture, will make a survey in Umatilla county to determine the actual cost of wheat production and the fundamental factors contributing to successful wheat growing. A party of federal and state agriculturists has recently completed the first year's work of a three year survey in Sherman county. In the party making the survey were Mr. Washburn, H. D. Scudder, chief in farm management of the Oregon experiment station and R. V. Gunn, farm management demonstrator, extension service, and assistants. The survey consists of 150 records that include complete labor costs of the crop. Records of time and cost of plowing with horses and with tractors were obtained for comparing the two methods. The facts brought out by the survey, together with those from similar surveys in the Palouse district of Washington and Idaho, will be used by extension workers in farm demonstrations of successful practices.

**Up Freewater Way.**  
 The Freewater district in Umatilla county has the "edge" by a couple of weeks on other sections in getting its fruit to market. It shipped 27 carloads of strawberries before other sections and it has already harvested and shipped its prunes, heading Payette, Idaho, by a fortnight. S. D. Sanderson of the Freewater Times registered at the Hotel Oregon, says that 700 girls were engaged picking prunes. The Freewater prune is shipped green and sent to the eastern markets in that condition, and ripens on the way. Only the Payette prunes and a strip of country in Florida and another in Maryland have this advantage of shipping green, and Freewater has an advantage of two weeks over these other favored spots. There were 680 carloads of prunes shipped from the Freewater district this year, the growers commanding an average price of \$55 a ton, which they consider satisfactory, since there is little trouble with the crop, the growers simply picking them off the trees and throwing them into boxes. In addition to the prunes, the Freewater district has yielded 1500 carloads of apples this year. The district confines its efforts to prunes and apples, with a few strawberries as a side line.—Oregonian.
