Jack Rose, brother of Mrs. J. Dockweiler, came up from Pendleton Sunday and will spend a few days here.

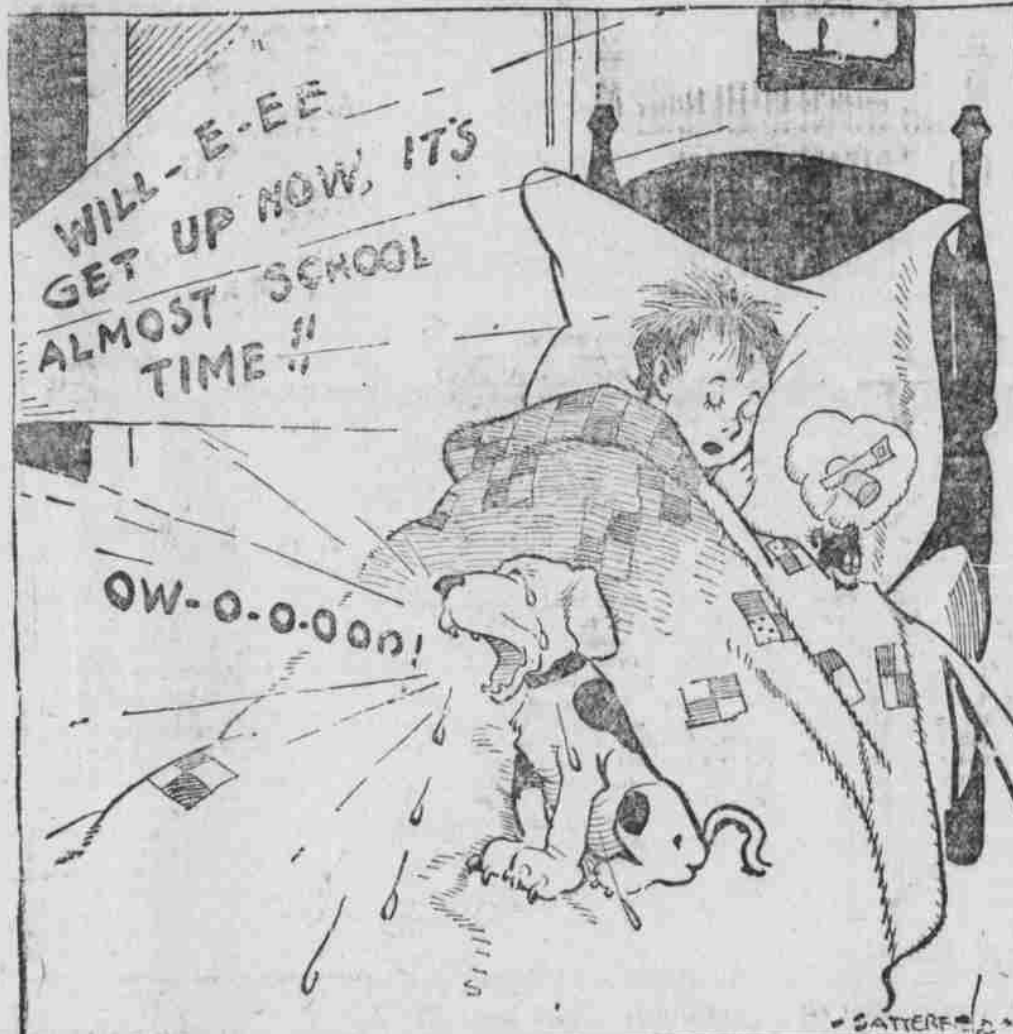

## PENDLETON FOLK ENJOY OUTING AT MEACHAM

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## COMMERCIAL CLUB HAS LARGE ATTENDANCE

(East Oregonian Special.)

HERMISTON, Aug. 31.—A big crowd was out at the commercial club meeting Tuesday for the discussion of dairying. In addition to most of the business men from the town there was a large number of farmers from all over the project. Men who have been engaged in dairying here were asked to give their experiences for the benefit of others who expect to get cows.

It was the opinion of all who spoke that better money can be made by keeping the cows than by selling the hay. J. H. Reed estimated that if one had really good cows he could get twice as much out of his hay as by selling it. W. A. Ford who lives near Umatilla was called upon. He keeps 10 cows and gets from \$50 to \$100 from his cream checks in addition to what he gets out of feeding the skimmed milk to chickens and hogs.

H. K. Dean of the experimental farm, Fred Benson, county agent and L. A. Hunt of the Oregon Hay Growers were called upon and spoke favorably of dairying. Mr. Hunt though managing the association for selling hay believes farmers should use some of their hay on the farm and that the section must have diversified farming.

E. P. Dodd, president of the commercial club, appointed a committee which will work on the question and get data on who wants to buy cows. The members are F. C. McKenzie, hardware dealer, Geo. Root, farmer and L. A. Hunt of the hay association.

Other speakers at the gathering were J. H. Reed, Geo. Grassy, and W. A. Hannan.
