PORTLAND WILL HELP JOBLESS THIS WINTER

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 5.—Unemployment in Oregon approaches the 15,000 mark, according to A. W. Jones, director of the Portland Municipal employment bureau, who bases his estimate on reports from all sections of the state. The normal unemployment in Oregon is about 10,000.

The greater part of the army of jobless men is composed of unskilled workers. However, all the building trades report unemployment which averages 40 per cent, Jones reports, and in the miscellaneous trades 20 per cent are without work.

The harvesting of the hop crop in Oregon, beginning September 1 and lasting four weeks, will provide temporary relief for a few thousand who are now without work.

The city of Portland, anticipating an unusually "hard winter," is already making tentative plans for creating work for unemployed men who are citizens.

DISTURBERS OF DANCE JAILED AFTER FIGHT

Instructions to managers of dance halls to permit no fighting in their places on threat of having the halls closed if the order is not complied with have been issued by the city authorities. The ruling is a result of disturbances that have occurred on Saturday nights recently.

Last Saturday night for men employed on the new hospital wing started trouble at Union Hall, and when Clem Ward, manager, started to eject the belligerent of the game, the other members came to the assistance of their leader. The police had to be called before quiet could be restored. James Thompson, A. Siefert, G. M. Russe and H. Presser were the members of the quartet. They were placed in jail and were given their freedom Sunday morning on bonds of \$125 each. They are said to have caused trouble before. Their trial in city court will be held Tuesday morning.

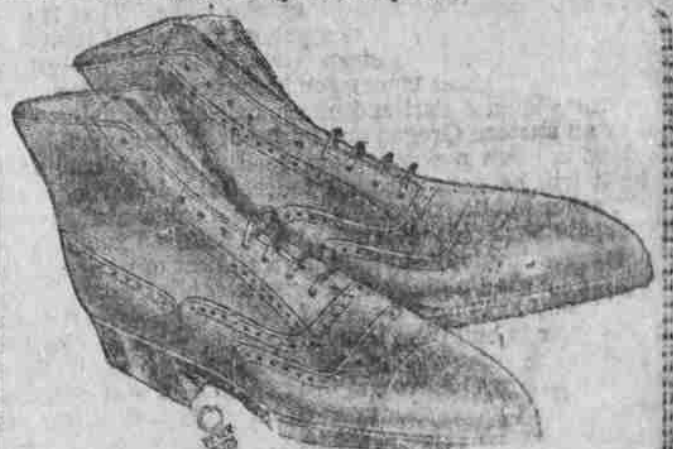
