### Man Second Operation.

A second operation for the transfusion of blood to be performed within less than a week was performed last night about 10 o'clock at St. Anthony's hospital when blood was transfused from H. P. Hooper for the benefit of Mrs. R. W. Ayres. The first operation was performed Friday of last week when Mr. Ayres submitted

to the operation for the benefit of his wife. Her condition is gradually improving, according to reports.

### West Enders optimistic.

People on the west end of the track are not worrying a great deal these days. Mark Cleveland, newspaper man here on business yesterday, declares. There will be 50 carloads of apples shipped from Stanfield this year, he says, an increase of 100 per cent over last year. The hay growers are feeling optimistic over their chances, too. Demand for livestock feedings are not so keen as they have been, and prices are lower, but the hay growers' association has received some excellent offers for hay. One of the best offers is for \$11 a ton f. o. b. The cost of hauling is down to \$2.50, and by buying cooperatively a big saving on baling wire was made. Export demand is picking up, too, and prospects last week when Mr. Ayres submitted

A percentage standing of 1,000 per cent was tallied by Ralph Burgess, Ruben Smith and Roy Purcell, who returned last night from the John Day country where they succeeded in getting a buck for each man in the party. Two of the bucks are six-pointers, and the third was a two-pointer. They have been able to get bucks consistently during past hunting seasons.

### Home-seekers 'Are Coming.'

Home-seekers from the Middle West to the number of between 40 and 50 are expected to arrive in Pendleton on Monday morning, September 25, just after the Round-Up. The bulk of the farming lands in Umatilla county. The four of the home-seekers is being made by the state chamber of commerce in cooperation with the Union Pacific railroad. Pilot Rock, Echo, Stanfield and the irrigation projects in the west end of the county have been designated as parts of the territory in which the visitors are particularly interested.

### Arrive from Boston.

Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Patterson of Boston arrived in Pendleton today to be guests of Col. Charles Willington Foster during the Round-Up. They have been on the road since July 11, driving overland in a specially designed truck. They secured a special body and placed it on a Dodge chassis, and their outfit is one of the neatest seen here during the season. Equipment weighing 2000 pounds is carried on the truck. They came this morning from Walla Walla where they were met yesterday by their host. They are enthusiastic boosters for the West, their visits in Montana proving particularly delightful. Col. Furlong will entertain them at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Tinson during their visit here.

### Explained Rotary Principles.

A talk by Judge G. W. Phelps on the principles of Rotary was the chief feature of the weekly Rotary Luncheon Club today. The judge gave considerable history relating to the organization and the international character of its work. The cardinal principle of the international association is Service Above Self. The greatest benefit that one of the 1,000,000 members can expect is to back up the city's commercial organization and other worthy civic moves. It is not the function of the club to take up matters that properly come under the direction of the Commercial Club. An evening meeting of the Rotary club, for members and their wives is planned for later in the fall at which time Mr. and Mrs. Charles Cochrane, the former a prominent Rotarian, will be present.

### Visit Fish Pond.

"They're the healthiest lot of fish I ever saw in my life," is the way Mat Ryckman, state superintendent of hatcheries, expresses his enthusiasm over the condition of the 800,000 minnows being cared for at the fish pond at Bingham Springs. A visit to the pond was made yesterday by Ryckman in company with E. F. Averill, Mark Foster and Maxon Jack. The water has been in excellent condition for the young fish this summer, it is said, and these conditions, in combination with good food and care, have caused the minnows to do well. Some of them are already three and four inches long, though a majority of them will measure about two inches. They will be transferred to streams about October 1. Distribution will be made to the Umatilla river, Meacham creek, and then to the eastern and western parts of the county.
