GOOD TRAIN SERVICE FOR ROUND-UP PROMISED

The best train service ever offered visitors to the Pendleton Round-Up is promised for this year's show by William McMurray, general passenger agent of the O. W. R. & N. who is in Pendleton today.

Mr. McMurray, always an ardent Round-Up booster, says that he is receiving from all sections reports which promise a big attendance. Jack O'Neill, traffic manager for the Willamette valley, says that Eugene people are coming in force and will be represented by a \$5 piece band, the majority of whom are University of Oregon students.

In addition to the Journal Special which will bring 200 visitors here Friday morning, there will be a special from Portland Saturday morning and from Tacoma Thursday morning, says H. W. Hicks, traveling passenger agent. The Portland special is the official Portland Chamber of Commerce car and will bring 100 Round-Up fans, while the Tacoma car will bring 125 Tacoma business men who are members of the Tacoma Commercial Association.

President Carl R. Gray of the Union Pacific, Harry Adams, vice-president and who is in charge of traffic, and E. R. Edmunds, traffic manager for the O. W.
