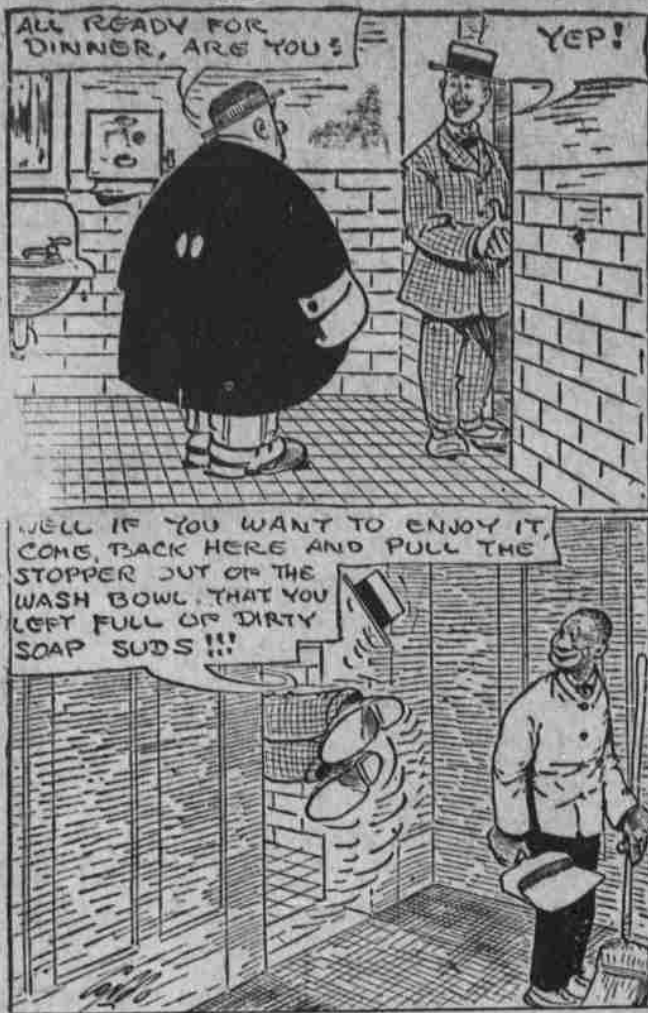
ATHENA ETUDE CLUB STARTS FALL ACTIVITIES

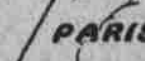
