BOAT EQUIPPED WITH PROVISIONS FOUND ON ISLAND

Warden Discovers Small Craft Containing Camping Outfit Near McNeil's Island.

THEORY THAT GARDNER IS ON ISLAND STRENGTHENED

Maloney Practices 'Still Hunting' in Effort to Discover Fugitive's Headquarters.

TACOMA, Sept. 14.—(U. P.)—Following Warden Maloney's discovery of a boat near the island fully provisioned apparently for escape from the island, he is confident a confederate placed the craft there for Gardner's escape. The boat contained a tent, food, blankets and all camping equipment. A boy reported he saw a man wearing a prison shirt kneeling through the brush.

CLEAN UP SQUAD TO SEEK OUT SOLDIERS WITH CLAIMS TO FILE

Four Government Officials Will Have Headquarters Here During Round-Up.

Oregon's clean-up squad, composed of government officials who are touring the state for the purpose of getting in touch with ex-service men who have claims of any kind against Uncle Sam, will be in Pendleton during the three days of the Round-Up and will be available each morning from 9 a. m. to 12 m. The auditorium of the public library will be their headquarters. Ex-service men with claims of any kind are urged to present on that date with their discharges and such other papers as might be useful in prosecuting a claim. This squad is composed of Dr. Wm. H. Morse, formerly of the U. S. Health Service; Clifford Wood, formerly of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance; a representative of the former federal board for vocational education; and K. Kiggins, of the American Red Cross. These men will assist in filing new claims and prosecuting old ones for compensation, vocational training, reinstatement and conversion of war risk insurance, allotments, back pay, travel pay, Liberty bonds, victory medals, etc. Dr. Morse will make prompt examination of all claimants where necessary and has authority to order men to hospitals where needed.

UMATILLA COUNTY WILL BE REPRESENTED BY 140 ENTRIES IN NORTHWEST GRAIN AND HAY SHOW TO BE HELD NEXT WEEK

Umatilla county will be represented by 140 entries in the Northwest Grain and Hay Show which opens here Monday and which will continue during Round-Up week. The entries are now ready and are fine examples of wheat and hay.

Other wheat entries for the show include 35 from Montana, 30 from Washington, 25 from Idaho, 25 from Morrow county, 20 from Sherman, 17 from Wasco, five from the Willamette Valley, 10 from Union and 10 from Walla Walla. There will also be about 75 hay entries, mostly from Umatilla and Morrow counties and from the Yakima valley. Dayton and Columbia will send entries by truck, says word received by Fred Bennion, secretary of the association in charge of the show.

LOOKS FOR HUNTERS WHO STEAL FROM U. S.

That hunters or poachers are taking government traps and in some cases are stealing coyotes and bobcats from traps owned by the government, is the statement of Stanley G. Jewett, predatory animal inspector of the U. S. Bureau of Biological Survey who arrived in Pendleton this morning to make an investigation into the situation caused by the acts of persons unknown.

A penalty of between five and 10 years in the federal penitentiary is provided in case of conviction, and an effort will be made by Jewett to secure some clue as to who is guilty of taking government property. The depredations have been noticed since the same season opened. Harold Dobbin operating a string of traps near Duacus, and it is believed that trout has been caused. Dobbin is said to be one of the most successful trappers and hunters in this section for some time.

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COURIERS RETURN AND HOLD SESSION WITH REPUBLICANS

It is Thought Irish Messengers Are Reporting on Reception Accorded Them by Premier.

RESULT OF CONFERENCE IS AWAITED WITH ANXIETY

Dail Eireann Approves Cabinet's Selection of Plenipotentiaries for Meeting.

DUBLIN, Sept. 14.—(U. P.)—The two couriers who took the Irish note to Premier Lloyd-George returned to Ireland today and went into immediate session with De Valera and the republican inner circle. They are believed to be making a report on the reception accorded them at Inverness. The result of the conference is awaited with anxiety. The Dail Eireann expects to go into session over the coming conference early today and approve the cabinet selections for plenipotentiaries to the coming conference.

Proposals to Be Published.

Reports from London indicate De Valera's reply to the British conference proposals will be published tonight. The Irish regard this news with mixed feelings. They are anxiously awaiting the publishing. There is some discussion as to whether the official announcement of the publishing refers to the conversations between Premier Lloyd-George and the Irish couriers at Inverness or whether it will be the text of the Sinn Fein reply to Britain's Inverness invitation. The Dail Eireann is also anxiously awaiting the meeting with De Valera today.

Dail Approves Appointments.

DUBLIN, Sept. 14.—(U. P.)—The appointment of five plenipotentiaries to the proposed conference at Inverness with the British representatives to discuss the settlement of the Irish question were approved by Dail Eireann today. The Dail also approved the reply to Lloyd-George's recent proposals. The plenipotentiaries, it was explained, were chosen to carry on negotiations which may or may not follow the receipt by Lloyd-George of the Dail cabinet's reply.

Ge Fifth Will Attend.

DUBLIN, Sept. 14.—(U. P.)—De Valera will not be a member of the Irish delegation to the peace conference at Inverness, it was officially announced. Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein, will head the new delegation which will discuss the terms with Premier Lloyd-George.

STATE FARM BUREAU PRESIDENT ADVOCATES BUILDING UMATILLA RAPIDS PROJECT BY THE PUBLIC

Power Resources of State Should Not be Left Unused is View of G. A. Mansfield.

That the Umatilla rapids project should be developed and that its development not await the pleasure of the private electric corporations is the view of George A. Mansfield, president of the Oregon state farm bureau federation.

Umatilla Power Project

My attention was recently called to your advocacy of this project, and an hour's study of the project, and the kind of opposition an appropriation by the government for the purpose of developing this project. As I understand the situation Umatilla Rapids will develop 120,000 horse power even during low water, and from 200,000 to 300,000 horse power during a considerable part of the year. This would furnish light, power and heat economically to numerous enterprises and to towns and farm homes, irrigate thousands of acres of land now unproductive and open the river, with proper provision to navigation.

FILM COMEDIAN APPEARS MORE DEJECTED TODAY

If Cleared of Murder Charge in Event of Trial Roscoe Still to Face Manslaughter Charge

OUTCOME OF INQUEST WILL SETTLE NATURE OF TRIAL

If Verdict Includes Any Action to Exonerate Comedian Manslaughter Will be Charged.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—(U. P.)—Roscoe Arbuckle and his attorneys appeared confident of winning the fight for the big actor's freedom when they appeared for the final session of the coroner's jury. Arbuckle is in a more cheerful mood than at any time since his arrest. The inquest room was crowded. Many women were present, despite the rumors of the unprintable medical evidence forthcoming. Arbuckle told the prohibition officers, attempting to wring from him information as to where he got the liquor for the St. Francis party, that they "had no liquor."
