JAPANESE PROFESSOR

Asserts Destiny of Nation is Bound up With Coming Disarmament C o n f e rence.

TOKIO, Sept. 16.—"The disarma-ment conference proposed by President Harding forms part of the plan of America to check the development of Japan by organizing the opinion of the world against her policy," declares Dr. Shinkichi Uesugi a professor in the Imperial University, in a serial article ontributed to the Nicht Nicht. destiny of Japan is completely bound in the settlement of the situation arising from the move of President Hard-ing. Has Japan confidence in her power to emerge from the trial with increased influence and prestige?

The Americans talk of the occupation of Yap Island as though it constituted a menace to their safety, and are seeking with all their powers for the cancellation of the mandate grant-

ed Japan over that island. "If Yap, under Japanese domination safety then Japan has more reasons for insisting on the withdrawal of America from Guam and the Philippines, since the geographical position of these islands makes them a positive menace to Japan. Japan will not evacuate Yap so long as her evacua-tion is not compensated by similar concessions on the part of America.

"What compels us to suspect America is her position in the Shantung question.
