THEIR MARTIAL BLISS DISTURBED BY RELATIVES

CLEVELAND, Sept. 17.—Money, liquor, relatives. These three are declared to Bradley Hall, Director of the Bureau of Domestic Relations, to be the principal causes of divorces and domestic troubles in Ohio.

"The extravagance of the wife, the shiftlessness of the husband, or the desire of the wife to be free to earn her own money and thus enjoy a better economic status, all tend to loosen the matrimonial bond," he declared.

Hall's duties bring him in direct touch with causes of domestic unhappiness, and there are few who can speak with greater authority than he upon the troubles which cause the breaking

up of homes and the separation of families.

"Liquor, he said, while still in the first three as a moving factor in the breaking of the marriage tie, is not nearly so important as it was before the advent of prohibition.

"While none of one sort or another is still plentiful," he continued, "its cost is high, and law enforcement makes it more or less difficult for the average man to satisfy whatever desire he may have for alcoholic drinks.

Home A Supply Base Now

The housing shortage, too, contributes to the unrest. The newlyweds live with their parents to save expenses. Petty quarrels between the young folks, which would be forgotten with the dawn of a new day were they living alone, are taken up and prolonged by the older people until they become festering sores that end too often in the divorce court. Recollections become difficult, because the older people display too lively an interest in the outcome.

"Too great emphasis is placed by the older people upon material things, Hall believes. Home nowadays is too often only a place to eat and sleep, as it were, from which forays are made upon the world at large for the things that people now regard as important. "In other words," he said, "the home is only a means to an end—not the end itself, and this makes for unrest when young will clash and the income dwindles. There is not that unity of interest that used to be so marked a feature of our home life, with the husband earning the money, and the wife safeguarding its outgo.

Hall also declared that changes wrought in war's aftermath contributed much to clogging the divorce courts. Many young fellows, returning from overseas, he said, had contracted the wanderlust.

"And what's the remedy for all this?" the interviewer asked.
"More emphasis upon spiritual values; less upon material well-being," he answered. "America is suffering more from the breaking up of family life than from industrial depression or any other cause. The disease from which we suffer is within us. The cure, also, can be found there."
