China, according to authoritative information, will refuse to accept the recent Japanese proposals for returning Shantung, Japan. It is believed, may assume the attitude she has the right of retaining control of Shantung if China refuses to accept her proposal. Secretary Hughes is anxious to attain a settlement of the question prior to the conference.
