THREE MEMBERS OF FAMILY MURDERED AND ANOTHER ONE INJURED

Theory is Advanced That Deed Done by Maniac or Someone With Grudge Against Family

DOWAGIAC, Mich., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Bloody finger print, and a nail-studded club are the only clues today to the fiendish murder of three members of one family. Willis Monroe, his wife Mary and his 17-year-old daughter Neva were found in bed with their skulls crushed. Ardith, another daughter, 12 found with her face beaten beyond recognition and skull fractured, will probably die. There is no trace of robbery. The police advance the theory that the deed was done by a maniac or someone with a grudge against Monroe. Ardith Monroe, battered and bruised, has regained consciousness in the hospital. Physician made attempts to question her. She said nothing but "Mamma, dear, what happened." The coroner's jury are investigating the crime. Ardith will probably lose her mind, according to physicians.
