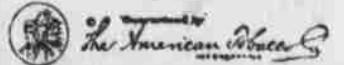

**MRS. DERR ADMITS
 THROWING ACID IN
 HER HUSBAND'S FACE**

**Told Authorities She Wanted
 to Make Him Suffer But Did
 Not Mean to Kill Him.**

AKRON, Ohio, Sept. 23.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Minnie Derr, arrested following her husband's funeral, admitted throwing acid in his face, causing his death. "I wanted to make him suffer. I did not want to kill him," she told the police. She told the authorities he abused her.

Mrs. Derr said her husband frequently came in late at nights, forced her from her bed and made her cook for him. Then he swore at her and went to bed. She said she wanted to make him suffer for the mental torture he caused her.

"I saw his face shining in the moonlight. I went downstairs, mixed lye and water and splashed it over his upturned face while he was in bed," Derr was unable to talk before he died.
