### PERCENTAGE SHOULD BE BASIS OF PAYING FIGHTERS IS CLAIM

Cortelyou of Ohio Opposed to Guarantees and Thinks Gate Should Decide Amounts.

CHILADELPHIA, Sept. 24.—One of the strongest arguments for a rule to force boxers to fight on a percentage basis instead of a guarantee took place here August 31 at the Phillies Ball Park.

The fans saw three bouts for nothing, and Promoter Louis Malis lost several thousand dollars because Willie Jackson and Johnny Dundee, New York lightweights, who were to meet for the eleventh time, couldn't draw a gate big enough to pay them \$2,000 apiece.

Malis offered the managers of Jackson and Dundee \$2,500 in cash and a personal check for the remainder. Dundee's manager accepted but "Doc" Bagley, manager of Jackson, demanded cash or nothing. The banks were closed and Malis was out of luck. He announced to the crowd that there would be no Jackson-Dundee fracas, and that their money would be refunded. Malis lost \$4,000 paid for the preliminaries. If Jackson and Dundee had fought on a percentage basis they would have got about \$2,000 apiece.

Director of Public Safety Cortelyou, who supervises boxing in this city, is a strong advocate of the percentage basis plan, and indicated he may request promoters to put it into effect here.

"The only fair way of conducting a boxing show is on the percentage basis," he said. "Boxers are worth no more than their drawing power. If boxing should be put on such a basis here, and should any fighter refuse to accept the money he drew on this basis, no matter how small an amount, he would never box in Philadelphia again."

The percentage basis is the only fair way to the public, the promoters and to the boxers themselves, Cortelyou said.

### IMPROVEMENT MADE IN ROADS BY RAINS

General road conditions throughout Oregon have been improved by the rains and snow of last week and macadam roads should soon be in their best condition for the year. Dirt roads over which there has been market travel and which have been very chunky and dusty have also improved with the heavy rains. Traffic in this section has been extremely heavy for the past two weeks owing to the Round-Up and the fact that the tourist season for transcontinental trips is almost over, forcing eastern people to hurry home. Early in October the main arteries to the east will be practically closed.

**Columbia River Highway**  
Pendleton to Seuferts good macadam road except few hundred feet at Cape Horn yet unfinished. Seuferts to The Dalles paved. The Dalles to Gooseberry Springs detour out of The Dalles 3 miles. Gooseberry Springs to Rowena highway in fair condition. Look out for construction trucks. Rowena to Marsh Pit good macadam. Marsh Pit to Mayerdale paved. Mayerdale to Mosier road closed for paving follow detour 2 1/2 miles into Mosier. Mosier to Hood River 2.3 miles paved remainder good macadam. Hood River to Astoria paved exception one mile through Rainier. Arrangement "give" The Dalles and Mosier effective only until September 26, then traffic will have to take old road from The Dalles to Hood River.

**Old Oregon Trail**  
Pendleton to La Grande first 20 miles macadamized. From this point to Hilgard rough country road; from Hilgard to La Grande under construction, very rough, watch for danger signs. La Grande to Baker paved to Hot Lake, Hot Lake to Union under construction, closed. Take foot hill detour. Union to North Powder being macadamized, road in fair condition. North Powder to Baker good, one turnout at bridge under construction at Wolf Creek. Baker to Huntington, to Nelson good country road. Nelson to Huntington, new grade now open to public, extent from Gale's crossing to Weatherby hotel. Line to overland crossing use old road at these two points, old road in good condition. Ferry at Olds for Idaho and Salt Lake.

**Oregon-Washington Highway**  
Heppner Junction to Gilliam-Morrow county line, rough. To Ione detour Lexington to Jordan. Ione to Heppner very rough. Heppner to Umatilla-Morrow county line, fair. To Pilot Rock very rough under construction. Pilot Rock to Pendleton macadam road, good except mile out of Pendleton. Pendleton to Walla Walla paved. Good road to Spokane.

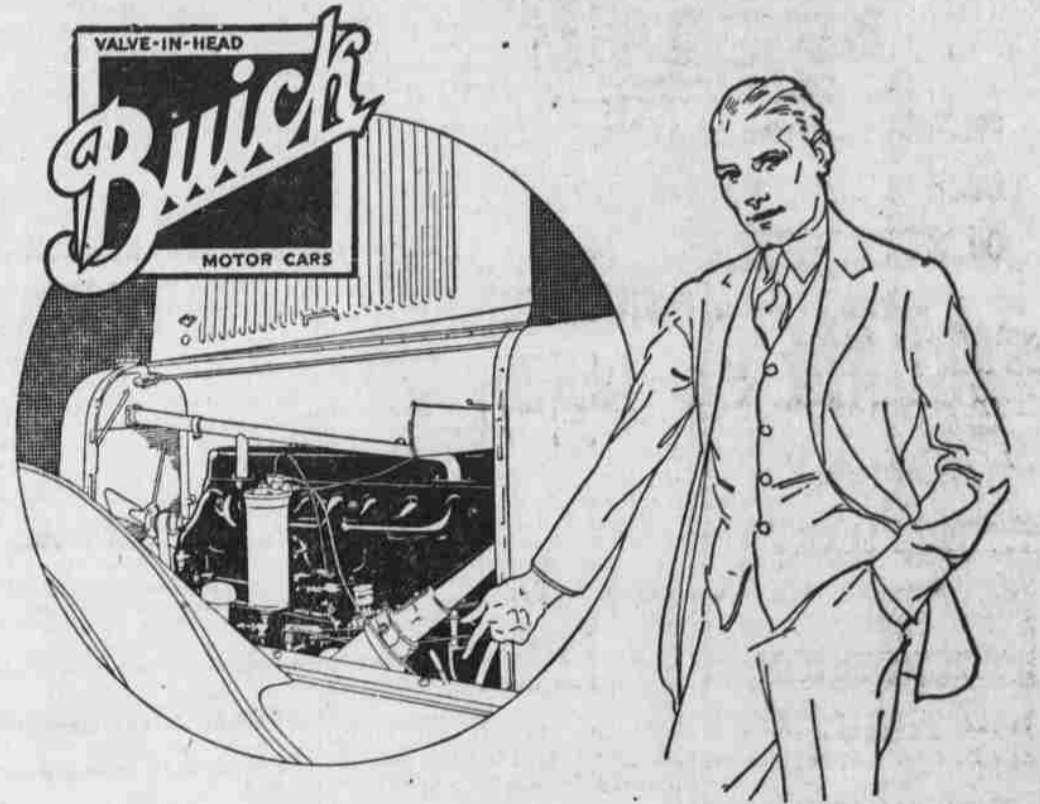
**La Grande Enterprise Highway**  
La Grande to Island City paved. Island City to Elgin good country road. Elgin to Minam first 5 miles macadamized. Minam hill to Wallowa canyon fair. Wallowa canyon to Joseph under construction, detours well marked. Joseph to Wallowa Lake fair country road.

**Enterprise-Flora Highway**  
Rough in places but possible throughout.

**Baker Unity Highway**  
Baker to Unity good mountain road.

**Baker Cornucopia Highway**  
First ten miles from Baker macadamized, remainder fair road.

**Pendleton John Day Highway**  
Open through to Grant county. Take
