## BIG TEAMS OF SOUTH IN GOOD FETTLE FOR FOOTBALL THIS YEAR

Centre and Georgia Tech Will  
Be Strongest Teams From  
Present Dope Available.

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 29.—(U. P.)—With schedules spiced up by numerous star intersectional battles, 1921 football in the south promises to live up to year's standard which established the gridiron sport on a high plane.

Georgia Tech, with most of last year's stars available, is considered the favorite for the championship. Centre, however, will have to be considered, regardless of Tech's victory over the Colonels last year when Moran's team was caught in bad condition after the Harvard game and was beaten.

The big intersectional battles are Centre and Harvard, Georgia Tech and Penn State, Georgia Tech and Rutgers, Georgia and Harvard, Tulane and Detroit, and Tennessee and Dartmouth.

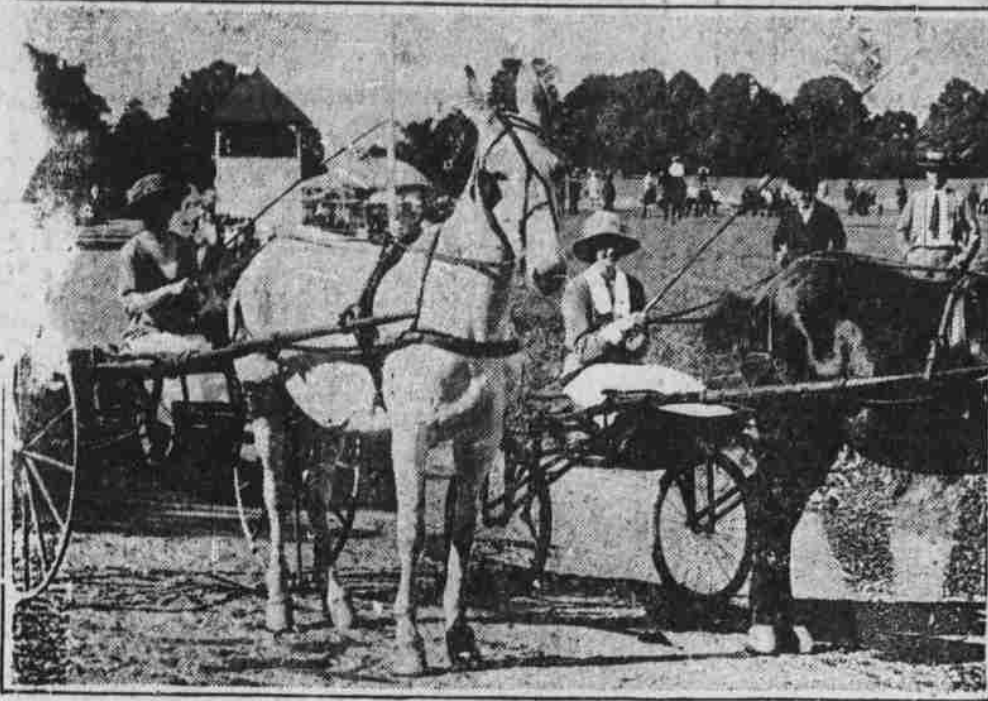

## CADETS WANT TO GET MIDDIES IN FOOTBALL WHEN RIVALS TANGLE

Army Team of Last Year Held  
Practically Intact for  
Stiff Playing This Year.

WEST POINT, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Broad grins wrinkle the faces of the Cadets every time they think of the 1921 season. Last year's reverses are forgotten by the bright prospects of success on the gridiron this fall.

The navy is already marked down as a victim of the 1921 Army machine, and the game with the sailors is the only thing that counts with the soldiers.

Head Coach Daley has intact the team of last year. That means that rudimentary football will not be necessary in the early stages of training and that team work can be accomplished to the maximum.

The brilliant French is expected to be the greatest star of the year. He scored 92 points in seven games last year, and with a better running machine this season he is almost sure to do at least as well.

The backfield is expected to be one of the best and fastest on the eastern gridiron, and the whole team, with such stars as French, Willhide, Greene, Breidster and Davidson, ought to make a great record with a schedule that gives the soldiers the greatest opportunity of history to bid for a championship.

The schedule starts off with two double headers on successive Saturdays, and it includes the regular feature game with Notre Dame, an innovation in the way of a trip to New Haven for a game with Yale and a second intersectional contest with Washington.

The schedule complete is: New Hampshire and Springfield, Oct. 1; Middlebury and Lebanon Valley, Oct. 8; Wabash, Oct. 29; Notre Dame, Nov. 5; Villa Nova, Nov. 12; Navy, Nov. 26.
