PENDLETON HIGH ALL SET FOR OPENING GAME OF SEASON WITH KENNEWICK GRIDIRON ELEVEN

Washington Team Expected to
be Tough Opponents for Locals
in First Go; Game 2:30.

Tomorrow afternoon at Round-Up park where a week ago championships of the world were decided by sundry men and women with horses and steers, the Pendleton high school football team will offer gridiron fans an opportunity to get a line on their quality when they play their first game of the season.

Kennewick high school's warriors will be the opposing team for the opener, and while nothing definite is known of the team this year, Coach Hanley is expecting the game to be a hard-fought one. The Washington aggregation had a hard-fighting bunch last season. They handed Pasco a defeat by a tune of 28 to 0, and the best the locals could do with the Pasco gang was 14 to 7. So if last year is any criterion of what this year will be, neither side should have an easy time.

Coach Hanley has devoted his time largely to simple fundamentals of the game in an effort to get his recruit players whipped into shape on essentials before they go into actual playing. Improvement does not come quickly in this kind of work, but a vast change in the ability of the team has been secured during the past week.

For the past two afternoons, practice has been held at the Round-Up park. Wednesday night the first and second teams scrimmaged while the

varsity men had a good edge over the second team. Last night kicking, signal work and special drills for the line men took up most of the time, and the workout for this afternoon is scheduled to be light and snappy.

Game Called at 2:30
As officials for the opening game the management has secured Fred Doherty to referee, Rex Ellis as umpire and Ad Huey for head linesman. The game will be called at 2:30 o'clock sharp.
