## EASTERN OREGON AUTO CLUB'S ROAD REPORT

**Columbia River Highway.**  
 Pendleton to Seufert, good macadam. Road for about 300 yards past the Horn only 12 feet wide. Constructors still working at this point, travelers cautioned to go slowly, travel loose on both sides, keep on level in passing. Seufert to The Altes paved. The Dalles to Mosier, paving operations, road closed except from 7 a. m. and after 5:30 p. m., and from 12:15 and 12:45 noon, travel can detour over old road over Seven Mile Hill at all hours, fair condition. Mosier to Portland paved, Portland to Astoria paved except one lie through Rainier, which is gravelled but quite rough.

**Old Oregon Trail.**  
 Pendleton to La Grande, first twenty miles macadamized; from end of macadam to Hilgard, rough country road; although this road is better, ice the fall rains. Hilgard to La Grande under construction, in fair condition, watch for warning signs, and fly, miles west of La Grande road to raffic cone before 8 a. m., and after 5:30 p. m. and at noon. La Grande to Hot Lake paved and macadam. Hot Lake to Union, under construction; valley road to Union closed, take foot hill detour at Union; short detour at grade passing mile west of Telocast; detour at North Powder overhead and detour for bridge construction Wolf creek and Jimmy creek. Wolf with Powder to Baker macadamized, Baker to Nelson good county road; a rough since the fall rains. Nelson to Huntington, new grade, rough, turns well marked, balance fair, detour to Ontario, under construction, keep to the Idaho side. Ontario to Nyasa, excellent macadam road.

**Oregon-Washington Highway.**  
 Washington state line to Pendleton paved. Pendleton to Pilot Rock macadamized. Pilot Rock to Vinson under construction. Vinson to Heppner paved. Heppner to Gilliam county line; less dust since recent rains; detour Lexington to Jordan. Jordan to take new grade, lone to Morgan new macadam, Morgan to county line, shoulders loose, the local roads somewhat what improved by rains, duty line to Columbia river highway fair.

**La Grande-Enterprise Highway.**  
 La Grande to Island City, paved; Island City to Elgin, recent rains have improved this road in excellent condition; Elgin to Minam first five miles macadamized; from end of macadam over hill, rough; from Minam to Wallowa under construction, for the part macadam, detours well marked between Wallowa and Enterprise rough. Enterprise to Joseph, macadamized, Joseph to Lake, road in excellent condition for county road.

**Enterprise-Flora Highway.**  
 Enterprise to Forest boundary possible and in fair condition; twelve lies through forest graded, and all at two miles macadamized. The remaining eleven miles to Flora along rocky ridge, rather rough.

## ENGLISH TRADE GETS BACK TO NORMALCY

LONDON, Oct. 22.—"The trade revival has begun," declares the Daily Express.  
 As the result of a survey of Britain's industrial situation, the Daily Express, which is owned by Lord Beaverbrook, himself a big factor in finance and industry, gives the following summary of conditions:  
 "While districts in the great manufacturing areas that have been practically idle for months are becoming increasingly active. The trickle of orders is becoming a steady stream, and inquiries made by a representative of the Daily Express in commercial and industrial circles revealed a firm note of optimism where hitherto there have been gloom and depression."  
 "Organization, determination, a realization that great slump is curable, and, above all, a newly-found will to work, are bringing about a great change."  
 "Here are some of the recent developments:  
 "Tinplate works that have been closed since the Spring are reopening.  
 "Iron and steel works both in Wales and Scotland are being reopened in circumstances that are full of promise for the immediate future. One big establishment in South Wales has just reopened after having been closed for a year. More works are to be restarted at Middlesbrough next week.  
 "The Welsh export coal business is steadily expanding.  
 "Cotton machinery manufacturers are filled with orders that will last them for two years ahead.  
 "An immediate although perhaps more gradual improvement in the cotton trade is anticipated. The threatened lockout in the Lancashire mills was averted recently when the cardroom workers withdrew their claim to be paid wages during structural alterations to machinery.  
 "Ship repairing is recovering rapidly, largely owing to the ending of the long-drawn-out and disastrous strike of joiners. That strike resulted in many large repair jobs going to France and the Scandinavian countries. Tyne-side is now getting busy, and shipbuilding that has been held up is being proceeded with.  
 "The leather position has greatly improved, and the effect on the boot trade is already being felt.  
 "Motor-car manufacturers are laying ambitious plans for greater production at lower prices, and the forthcoming show is likely to herald a boom in this great industry."


