IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES HOME DEMONSTRATION

- FOR THE LUNCH BOX
 - Mothers who are at their wits' end in planning the children's school lunch will welcome the following suggestions.
 - Sandwiches with sliced, tender meat for filling; baked apple, cookies, or a few lumps of sugar.
 - Slices of meat loaf or bean loaf; bread and butter sandwiches; stewed fruit; small frosted cakes.
 - Crisp rolls, hollowed out and filled with chopped meat or fish, moistened and seasoned or mixed with salad dressing; orange, apple, a mixture of sliced fruits or berries.
 - Lettuce in celery sandwiches; cup custard; jelly sandwiches.
 - Cottage cheese and chopped green pepper sandwiches, or a pot of cream cheese with bread and butter sandwiches; peanut sandwiches; fruit cake.
 - Hard-boiled eggs; crisp baking powder biscuits; celery or radishes; brown sugar or maple sugar sandwiches.
 - If the sandwiches are wrapped in oiled paper, the lunch packed neatly and a paper napkin put in, the children's enjoyment of the lunch will be doubled and the mother will be amply repaid by their enthusiasm for a mother who cares.—V. D.
