### REVIVAL CONTINUES WITH GOOD INTEREST

 Evangelist Henshaw preached to a good audience at the First Christian church last night, using the text, "Come, let us reason together, tho' you sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow." (Isa. 1:18). By analogy he showed how Israel's sins and God's mercies and saving power were likened to indifference and sins of people today while God is offering blessings beyond our highest merits.

Mr. Henshaw declared that the worst condition a human heart can experience is that of utter hopelessness, wherein we ask, "Is anything worth while?" Such, he showed, is the overpowering and inticing influence of scarlet sin. The character of sin is such as to drive one to a loss of self-respect, a sense of discouragement and to feel the lash of conscience.

"God is calling to men today to come and reason with Him," said the evangelist. "A most unreasonable thing is sin. The most reasonable thing is to live a right life—that which the Son of God sets forth and which is promoted by His institution, the church." Christian baptism was administered at the close of the sermon.

A splendid choir and orchestra added much to the meeting. The "Question Box" is being more freely used, and is proving of much interest. Several questions were answered last night by Mr. Henshaw. In keeping with the sermon, Mr. and Mrs. Curtis sang a duet entitled: "Thy Sins Be as Scarlet."
