HERMISTON, Nov. 12.—Hermiston celebrated Armistice day yesterday afternoon with a program which was given at the Play House Theatre under the auspices of the American Legion. Rev. Alfred Lockwood of Pendleton was the speaker of the day. The program was as follows: Orders for service by the post adjutant, Earl Kingsley; prayer by Rev. Harry A. Wann; address of welcome by the post commander, Carl Voyer; vocal solo, "My Own United States," by Dr. P. V. Prime; coronet solo, "On Flanders

Field," by Henry Shelliday; address by the speaker of the day, Rev. Lockwood; community sing, "Star Spangled Banner," led by A. W. Adamson; benediction by Father Butler. A good crowd was in attendance. The service opened at 1:30 p. m. The Legion boys had originally planned a dance for the evening but omitted this in order not to conflict with a similar event scheduled by the Stanfield Legion.

Mrs. Letha King was conveyed this week to the Walla Walla hospital.

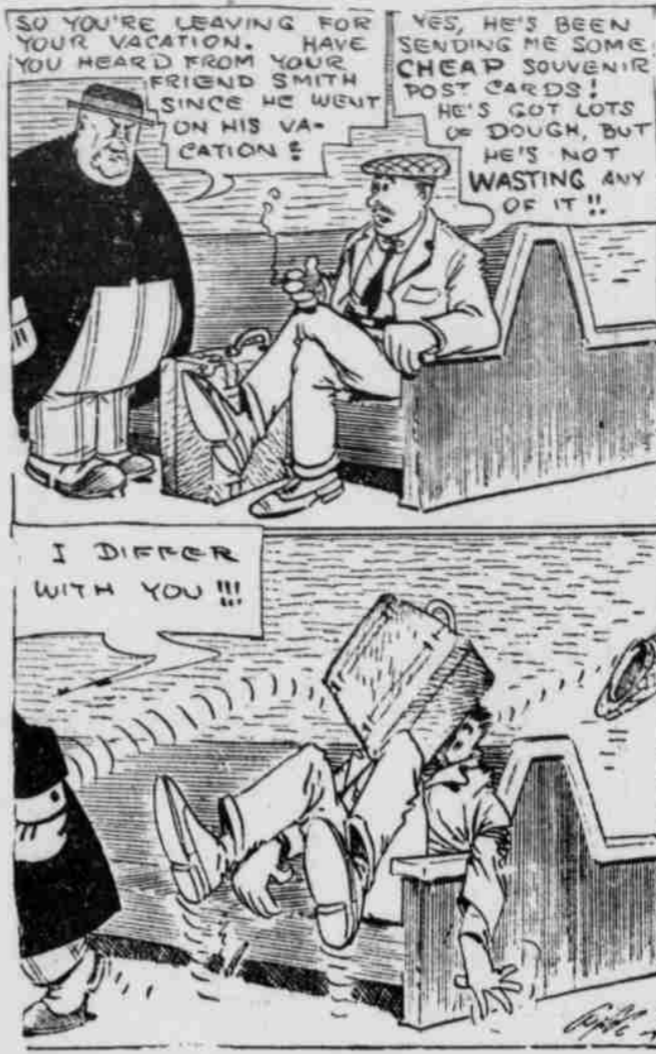
