Case Goes to Grand Jury.

Charles Burnett, guard in charge of Lukar Topisch, Portland man who was being brought to Pendleton to be placed in the state hospital, and who died on the train near Hood River, was bound over to the grand jury Saturday at Hood River. According to evidence, Topisch secured a vice-like grip on Burnett's hands and was forcing the guard over backward, when W. A. Meyer, a passenger, came to Burnett's rescue and choked Topisch until the latter let the guard drop. Topisch, according to testimony given, fell semi-conscious and was carried to the baggage car by Burnett and Thomas, whose aid Burnett had secured. Within 15 minutes Topisch died. Thomas swore that he saw Burnett kick Topisch repeatedly as the latter lay bound

on the baggage car floor. He testified that Burnett's hands were bloody and that he saw a rag on the floor which bore marks showing its use in wiping blood from someone's hands.

Miss Smith Here.

Miss Margery Smith, of the nutrition department at Oregon Agricultural College, was a Pendleton visitor Saturday and conferred with Mrs. Edith G. Van Dusen, home demonstration agent. Mrs. Smith is making a tour of the state and is visiting agencies in Oregon where county agents are employed. She left yesterday for Astoria. Miss Smith was formerly with the Dietetics Bureau in Boston. She is a graduate of Simons College and taught there as well as at Pennsylvania State College. Her work

in Boston, was among adults as well as children.

County Meeting Postponed.

Owing to the storm and its interruption of traffic a meeting of the Federated Commercial Clubs of the county, scheduled for tomorrow, has been postponed for one week.

Urgy Early Ordering.

Local stores are urging that Pendleton people order merchandise for delivery early in the morning, as there will be but two deliveries during the day, instead of four. One delivery is at 9:30 a. m., and the other at 2:30 p. m. There is a tendency among housewives, merchants state, to delay ordering until afternoon, making the morning delivery light and increasing the afternoon rush to such an extent that deliveries are difficult to make.

Late With Levies.

School districts and the towns of the county are late in reporting their levies, according to a report of the county assessor. The levies are due at the office of the assessor December 1, and up until Saturday evening only about one-third of the districts had made their reports, and only two towns, Hermiton and Pilot Rock, had reported. The levies must be posted or published 15 days before they are made in the case of the school districts and 20 days for the towns.

Chinook at Ukiah.

A report was current here this morning to the effect that the snow storm has been followed by a chinook at Ukiah which is taking off the snow at a rapid rate. Damage by floods are anticipated by some people here in the event that the run-off is rapid because of the heavy fall of snow. Sheriff Zook House recalls when in 1882 water was three feet deep on Court street on account of a heavy storm which brought the river up out of its banks. There was no levee to protect property at that time.

Going to Warm Springs.

Rev. J. M. Cornelison left last night for Bend where he is to attend a meeting of the executive commission of the Pendleton presbytery. On his return he will stop at Redmond where he and Parsons Motante are to give the pageant, "Seeking the White Man's Book of Heaven." He will also stop at Warm Springs reservation where an Indian revival meeting is underway. A number of Indians from here are going down to attend this meeting, among them being Mr. and Mrs. Luke Minthorn, Mr. and Mrs. Allen Putawa, James Crane, Mr. and Mrs. Parsons Motante and others.

To Erect Signs.

Black and white signs which will warn pedestrians of the danger of walking on the wrong side of the road, will be erected soon by the Umatilla county court. Decision to do this was reached last week by the members of the court as a result of the tragic death of James L. Wampler who was killed near Weston when a car struck him and hurled him to the pavement, crushing his skull. The signs will be placed between Pendleton and Ruth, Pendleton and Riverdale and between Freewater and the Oregon-Washington state line. Pedestrians are required by law to walk on the left hand-side of the road, and it is a misdemeanor to violate the statute.

Wyoming Sheepmen Optimistic.

That sheepmen in Wyoming are optimistic and will weather the financial storm in excellent condition is the statement of Mac Hoke who returned Sunday from points in that state where he has been for a week selling rams for the Cunningham Sheep Co. Low overhead expenses, lower rates in shipping their lambs and wool to market, and less of expense of holding of the wool, are three reasons why optimism in the state is better off than they are in Oregon, is Hoke's opinion. He was in Evanston, Baseline, Rock Springs, Kemmerer, Colorado and Arroyo which are in the principal sheep section.

FLYER BEHEADS OLD SPANIARD AT BARCELONA

LONDON, Nov. 21.—(U. N. S.)—How a British aviator nearly beheaded a Spaniard and was rescued by the local mayor because "he was an old man anyway," is told by the London Evening News on the strength of information received at the Crofton Air Station.

This pilot was one of many British aviators who make a specialty of taking up Spaniards for joy rides in and around Madrid and Barcelona. Occasionally, however, the excitement is too much for the Spaniards and, in their enthusiasm, they crowd on to the aerodrome, flinging toward the spot where they think the machine will land.

On this occasion the pilot made three attempts to alight, but each time the crowd spread over the ground, making landing impossible.

Finally, determined to get down to earth somehow, he flew low over the crowd, scattering them beneath him, and managed to find sufficient space where on to put down his plane. Just as he was landing he felt a slight bump, and after his machine had come to a standstill turned round to find that the under-carriage had struck one of the spectators, taking off his head with mathematical exactitude.

The crowd immediately became hostile and the pilot ran hard to the house of the mayor of the district. Entering breathlessly he told his story, and was slowly followed by some of the crowd who related their version of the
