Ask Mortgage Foreclosure.
 Judgment on a note and foreclosure of a mortgage given as security are sought by George H. Wolff in a suit against David Yates and Mary S. Yates, his wife, which has been filed in circuit court. The note was originally given in 1911, according to the complaint, and the principal and interest now amount to \$1,696. The money was loaned by Mountain View Camp No. 5095, Modern Woodmen of America, it is claimed in the complaint.

COOL WATCH NEWS EVENTS
 CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 21.—(U. P.)—A census just completed by Radcliffe College of its 600 enrolled students reveals that 94 per cent of the young women read the newspapers regularly. Seventy per cent read one or more "home town" papers as well.

Sixty-two per cent of the Radcliffe girls said they read the editorials of their newspaper regularly. The news columns ran second as a "favorite section."

THOUSANDS OF BARRELS OF APPLES ARE ROTTING

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 21.—Thousands of barrels of apples are rotting on the trees and upon the ground throughout the maritime provinces.

With the duty fixed at thirty cents a bushel, freight rates at thirty-nine cents a hundredweight and the cost of barrels at seventy-five cents each, the Canadian farmers rather than accept the small prices offered by American produce men are allowing most of the fruit to spoil rather than pick it from the trees.

For miles bright red and yellow fruit still clings to the trees, can be seen in the Annapolis Valley, while in the states top prices are asked for this good old pie-making material.

What is true of the apple likewise applies to the potato and turnip crops.

Potatoes can be purchased in Nova Scotia for sixty cents a bushel, and the price is still travelling downward.

Potatoes and turnips are being fed to cattle, the farmers preferring to adopt this measure of disposal rather than pay the high duty and the cost of barrels.

GREAT BRITAIN WOULD JOIN U. S. IN CASE OF WAR WITH JAPAN

LONDON, Nov. 21.—(U. P.)—Great Britain would be certain to join the United States in the event of a war with Japan, the London Times declared today, demanding abrogation of the Anglo-Japanese alliance.

MUST LABEL GAME SHIPMENTS
 The Bureau of Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture, calls attention to the fact that under Federal law all packages in which wild ducks, geese, and other migratory game birds are transported must have the name of the shipper and of the consignee and an accurate statement of the numbers and kinds of birds contained therein clearly and conspicuously marked on the outside thereof. Sportsmen shipping game birds without proper markings are liable to prosecution in the Federal court, and the birds to seizure and condemnation.

STORM KEEPS VOTERS FROM BOOTHS TODAY

The city election today has been demoralized by the storm to such an extent that virtually no voting whatever occurred during the forenoon. At the Lincoln school only six had voted at noon, another precinct and but a single vote at 11:30 today. At the court house only 11 votes had been cast early this afternoon. In nearly every precinct there was difficulty in getting the hours together so as to open the polls. In some cases voting did not start until long after the appointed time, 8 o'clock.

NANCE O'NEIL IN "THE PASSION FLOWER"
 The forthcoming engagement of that distinguished emotional actress, Miss Nance O'Neil in Jacinto Bonaventura's great drama, "The Passion Flower," at the Rivoli on Saturday Nov. 26, marks a break in the long line of frothy, here-today-and-gone-tomorrow type of amusement with which theatre goers have been regaled ever since the close of the war.

"The Passion Flower," says Miss O'Neil, "is a serious play by a serious, thinking dramatist and I have put months of serious thought into the characterization of the role of Ramonda which I consider the greatest role I have ever played. But seriousness does not necessarily imply morbidity, gloominess or a stage drenched in blood. Beneveto's work is a psychological study of a simple peasant people in whose veins runs the wildest Latin fire only curbed by a strong religious superstition with which their lives are bound and amongst whom a dastardly crime is committed upsetting the even tenor of their ways. The circumstances of the story might well have happened anywhere, not alone in Spain where naturally, Beneveto has laid the scenes of his masterly tale."

Many of Richard G. Herndon's friends predicted dire disaster when he announced the production of a foreign drama by a then little known author but his faith in the play and in Miss O'Neil's ability to ably interpret the author's thought and motif, has been fully vindicated and "The Passion Flower" bids fair to become one of the world's classic dramas.

HOW TO CHOOSE GOOD BOOKS FOR CHILDREN

(Seventh in a series of articles by Miss Freda Glover, assistant librarian. This article is on "Biography.")

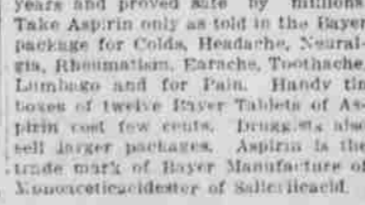
The reading of biography inspires, broadens and fires the ambition of children. It should give to the reader humility without discouragement. Children seldom care for the biography of character and personality. They prefer that of action, achievement and picturesque interest. It is not at all necessary to distinguish between biography for boys and for girls. Given a wide range, boys will choose heroes of physical strength and courage, like explorers, warriors and life savers. Girls turn to lines of romantic and picturesque interest, like lines of queens, nurses, etc.

Of course the author of a biography should have a thorough knowledge of authoritative sources—letters, journals, state papers, etc. He must know the country, times, home life and environment, antecedents and living friends, if any, of his subject.

The book must interpret the subject in relation to time and place, that is, it must make it plain that varying ideals of character and conduct have
