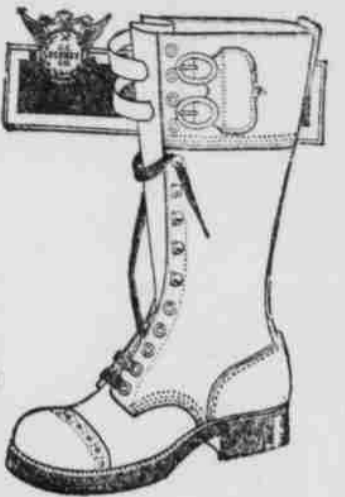

workers into idleness. It is said that in the State of Hidalgo alone 4,000 miners are out of work because of the suspension of operations. Additional men have been discharged by oil companies in the Tampico region, adding to the already serious problem there. But there is hope in a resumption of work in the oil fields within a short time. Terribly depressed conditions are reported in Oaxaca, where great numbers are idle. Pressing want, with little prospect of substantial relief, is reported in Yucatan and Campeche. In Vera Cruz the profit-sharing or "hunger" law has paralyzed industry and business, and distress is reported among the workers, who expected that the law would fill their pockets as never before. There are so many sections needing relief that the government is able to give little help because of the lean condition of the treasury. Some help is given, but it falls far short of what is needed. It is hoped that when recognition comes Mexico may be able to obtain money with which it will be able to improve conditions.
