Ray Jones has returned to his home on Weston Mountain after spending Thanksgiving with his parents Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Jones.

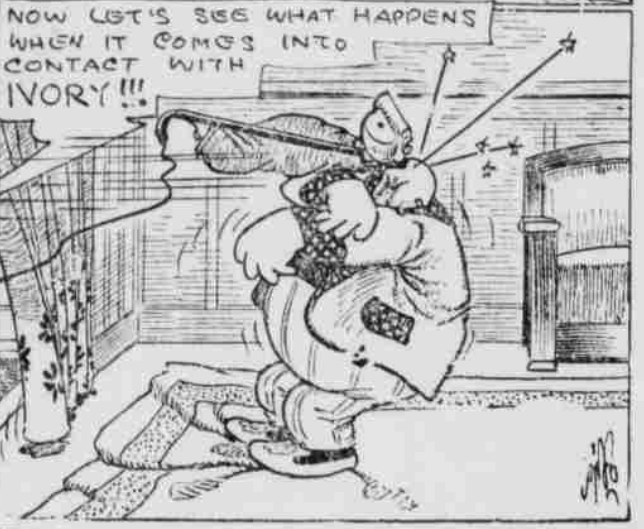
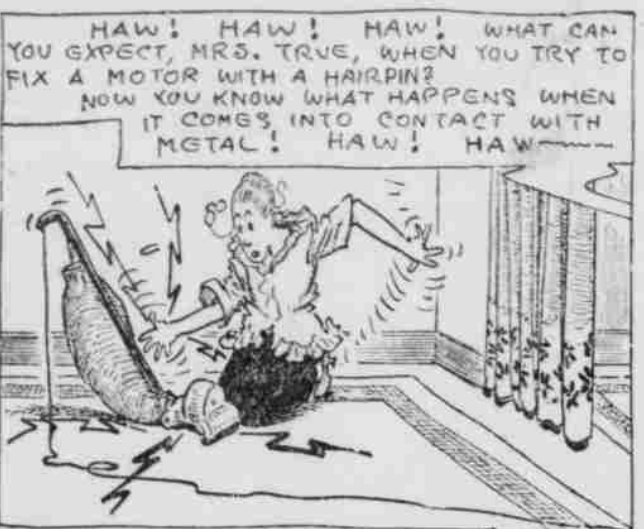
