IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES HOME DEMONSTRATION

- Raisin and Fig Conserve.
 - 2 cups dried figs, 2 cups water, 1 cup sugar, 1-3 cup orange
 - 1-2 cup orange juice, grated rind of 1 orange, 1-2 cup lemon juice,
 - 2 cups chopped seeded raisins, 2 cups broken walnut meats.
 - Chop figs. Cover with water and soak over night. Add sugar, orange juice and rind, lemon juice and raisins and cook slowly until thick—about 1 hour. Add nuts and cook 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized glasses and seal with paraffine. This makes about six glasses.—V. D.

MINING IN JAPAN AT LOW EBB, SAYS REPORT

TOKIO, Dec. 12.—(U. S. S.)—That mining activities in the Japanese Empire are at a low ebb is shown by a report recently given out by the Mining Bureau of the Department of Agriculture and Commerce. Serious decreases in the output of such important products as iron, silver, copper and sulphur make it apparent that the depression is widespread, although possibly in the case of coal an exception might be made. Even the coal has fallen from 2,917,982 tons in July last year—to 1,894,913 tons this year, while for the first seven months of the respective years there was a decline of over 1,500,000 metric tons.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 12.—(U. S. S.)—A gigantic mass meeting was held here for the purpose of launching a movement for the overthrow of the Peking government. Demonstrations are increasing daily throughout China.

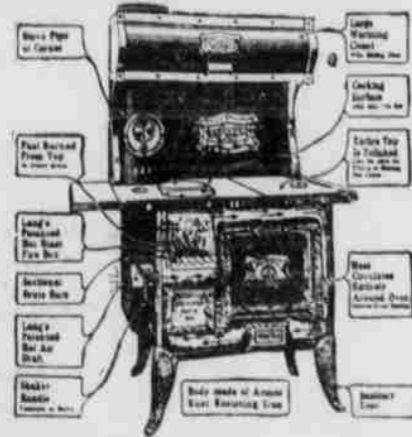
