POSTMASTER GENERAL HAYS MAY RESIGN AND HEAD PICTURE INDUSTRY

These vehicles have free use of the expensive roadways which are being constructed in all parts of the state. It is right and just not only that they be subjected to proper regulation, but that they pay a just and fair share of the revenue required to maintain such roads."

CHICAGO POLICE WARNED TO CLEAN UP BEATS

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—(U. P.)—Seven hundred and fifty persons, ranging from the socially elite to the residents of the city alleys, are facing the police judges today as one night's catch in Chicago's drive in bootlegging and liquor violations. "Clean up your beat or your job is gone" all the police have been ordered. The police raided homes without search warrants. Inclusive of clubs, the Casino Club among them, were not immune.

CALIFORNIA REPORTS XMAS FRUIT PLENTIFUL

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 19.—(U. N. S.)—The annual report of G. Harold Powell, general manager of the California Fruit Growers' Exchange, showed that during the 1920-21 season closed October 31, California shipped 60,147 carloads of citrus fruits. Of this amount 48,359 cars were oranges and grapefruit and 11,787 cars were lemons.

The 10,500 grower members of the exchange shipped for the same period 33,677 carloads of oranges and grapefruit and 9,915 carloads of lemons, making a total shipment of 43,592 cars, or 72.5 per cent of the entire citrus shipments from the state.

According to the latest figures available there are at present time approximately 113,821 acres of bearing orange trees and 47,758 acres of non-bearing trees in California, which within a few years will start producing. In addition to the 161,59 acres of oranges there are 59,554 acres devoted to lemons.

With early navel shipments running into the hundreds of cars, there should be plenty of oranges for the Christmas stockings of everyone this year.

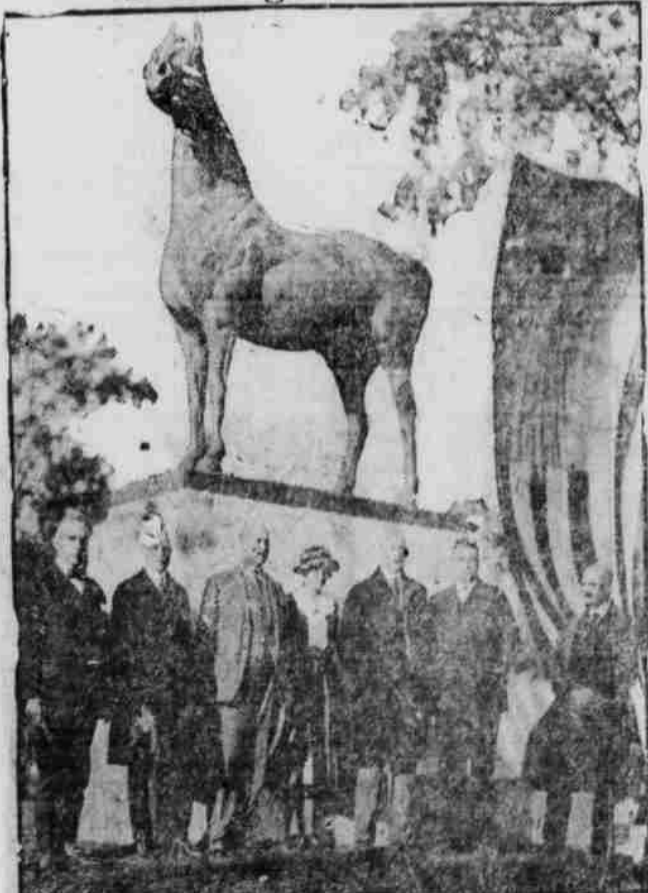

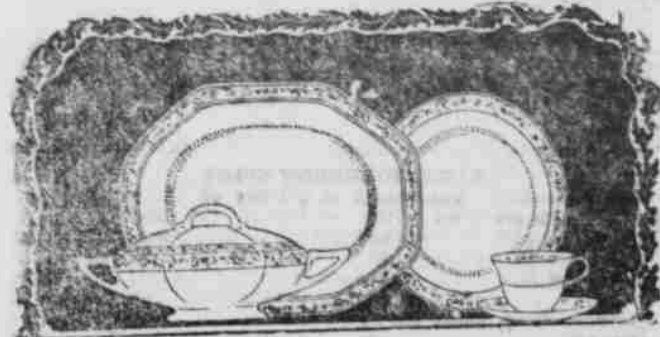

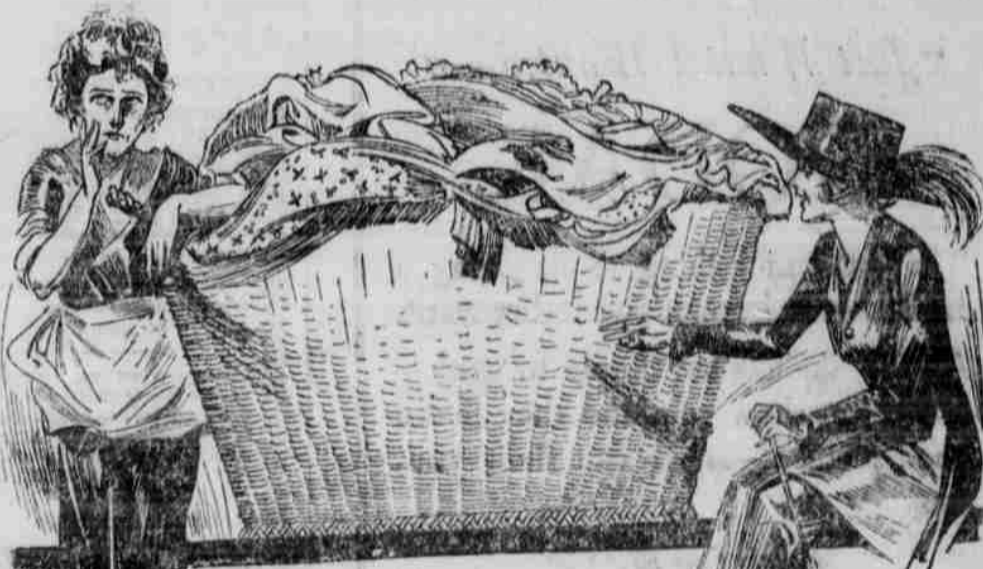
