They're going to reach to some secret place under the counter, dig out a big .45-caliber army revolver and shoot to kill.

IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

HOME DEMONSTRATION

Ink Stains

1.—If the stain is fresh, soak in fresh milk, allow to dry, then to sour. Rinse and repeat. This is the safest thing to use on colored or delicate fabrics.

2.—Wet the stain with cold water and apply a 10 per cent solution of oxalic acid (poison). Let it stand a few minutes and rinse. Repeat until stains disappear. Rinse in water to which borax or ammonia has been added.

3.—For use on white fabrics, there is Javelle water, hydrochloric acid, lemon juice and salt or alcohol. These may be used or substitute stains. Milk is the only ink stain removed that will not remove color.—V. D.
