PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—(A. P.)—Basketball will take center of the college sport stage soon after the Christmas holidays and from then until about March 1 there will be games between the leading varsity aggregations of Oregon, Washington and California.

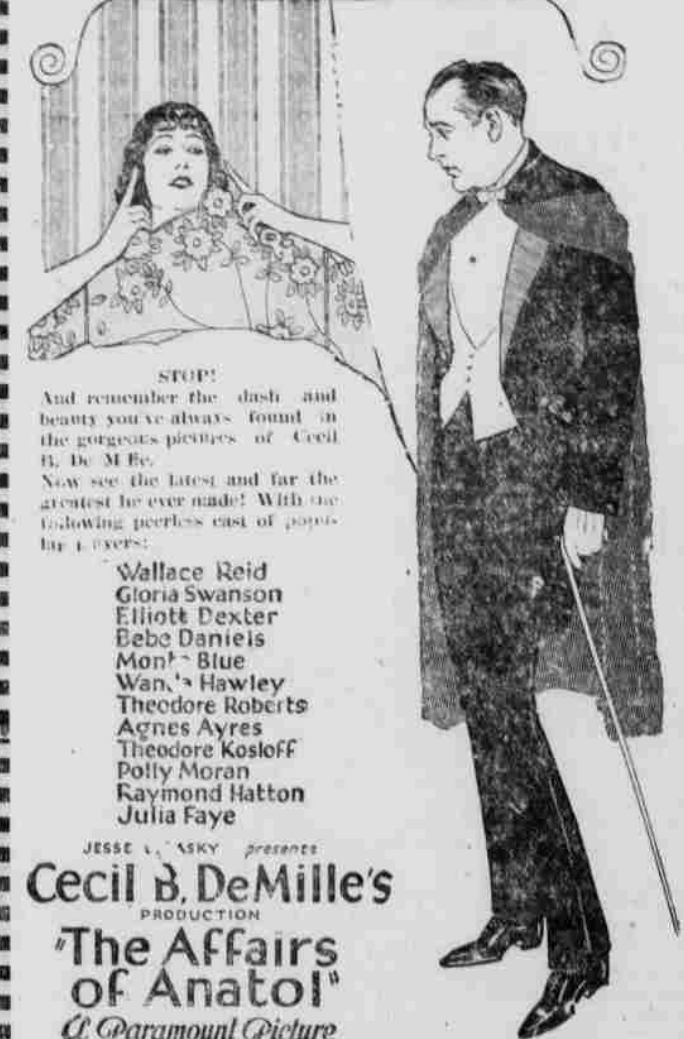

The result was an attractive suite designed by Paul Tribe—furnished with approximately \$50,000 worth of furniture. This included a valuable set of Louis XVI chairs, a magnificent carved photograph case of mahogany design, a grand piano, lamps, mirrors, table, a desk, lounge, pictures and bric-a-brac.

LOS ANGELES WILL MAKE EFFORT TO GET OLYMPIC GAMES SOON

Coliseum to Cost \$800,000 Capable of Seating 75,000 Persons Under Construction.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Fighting to the point of reality one of the most stupendous civic projects ever undertaken in the West, actual work of building a great Los Angeles Coliseum in exposition Park has begun.

The signing of the final documents whereby the construction contract for the huge coliseum, or stadium, was completed placed the mark of success on the efforts of two years by a large group of public-spirited business men of this city.

The structure will cost \$800,000 and will seat at least 75,000 persons. It can be used for athletic events of all kinds; for monster parades and spectacles and other public events.

Plans already are under way to attempt to secure for this city, as a result of the undertaking, the Olympic games which heretofore have been held in Europe.

Coliseum and stadiums in many cities were studied before plans for the local structure were completed. As a result many novel features of construction were worked out.

Unless the holders encounter unexpected delays it is expected some notable event can be staged during the Christmas holidays in 1922 as the opening attraction.

PREFERRED CART DRIVER JOB TO TEACHING SCHOOL

BERLIN, Dec. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Middle class Germans are so hard up that recently a Potsdam candidate for an instructor's post informed the government that he would become a dust cart driver rather than have the privilege of bringing up young Potsdamers. He said the peddling business would pay much better.

The government had given him to understand that he was one of 175 applicants for a position of regular teacher in German schools and that owing to his youth there was no chance for him at present.

WANT HELP IN SEARCH

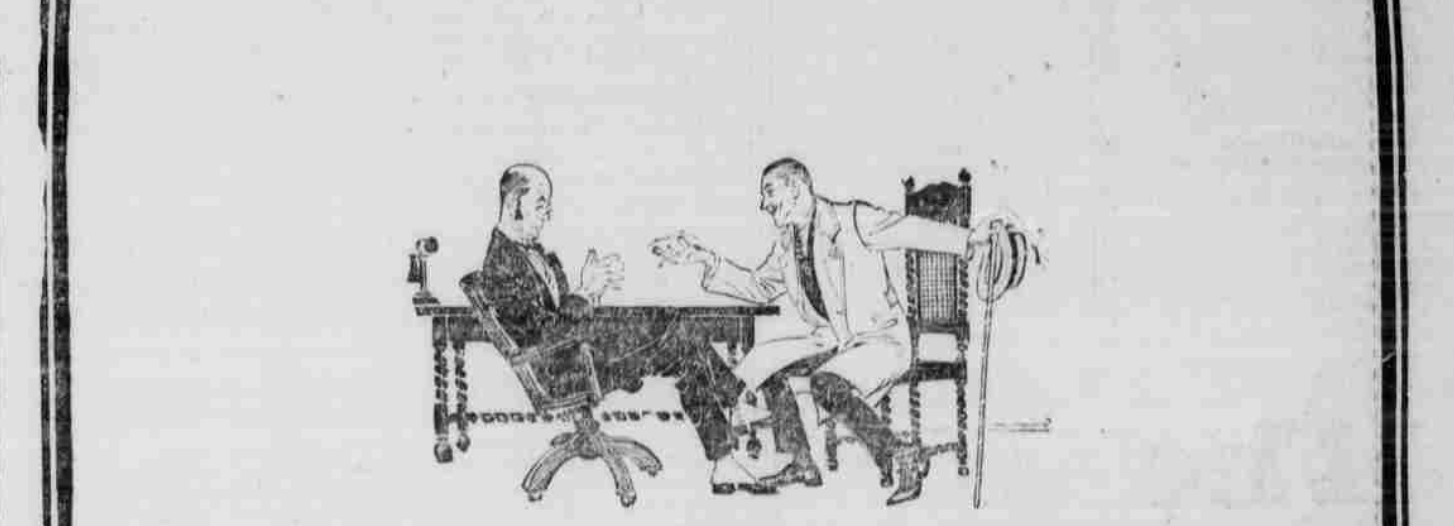
LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21.—(A. P.)—In the belief that somewhere along the Pacific coast there is located the forgotten grave of some veteran of the American Revolution, the Society, Sons of the Revolution, Los Angeles chapter, has announced its members soon will begin a search for such a grave, and it has appealed to similar organizations and the public to join in the quest.

According to a statement issued by the society, while most legends to arrive in the country now made up of the Pacific coast states shortly after 1800. The society believes the statement that among those who made their way across the plains or came by ship around Cape Horn, were possibly some who had seen service in the Revolution, and whose graves are located somewhere in the Pacific Coast states today.
