MERRY CHRISTMAS FOR DISABLED WAR VETERANS

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 23.—(U. P.)—Disabled veterans and their dependants in every community in the United States will be cared for Christmas day by American Legion members, according to plans announced today by national headquarters of the ex-service men's organization.
 Visits to the homes of sick and wounded ex-service men and to their families will be made by the Legionnaires and special committees will take care of the men still in hospitals. Entertainments and presents will be provided for the incapacitated veterans.
 In connection with the Christmas visits, Legion investigators will obtain information in regard to striking cases of neglect of the disabled and their families, following which action the members of the local posts will take up the claims of these men with the government and will assist their families in getting proper care.
 Information in regard to the location of disabled men will be ascertained through Legion post meetings, the Red Cross, local medical organizations, county and city officials, and, if necessary, through house-to-house work by Legion committees.
 "This is not a charity affair," said Hanford MacNider, National commander of the Legion. "It is the Christmas thought of one ex-service man for another who would expect his buddies to remember him if the positions were reversed. It does not matter whether the disabled lad is a Legion man or not; it is a Christmas meeting between ex-service men."

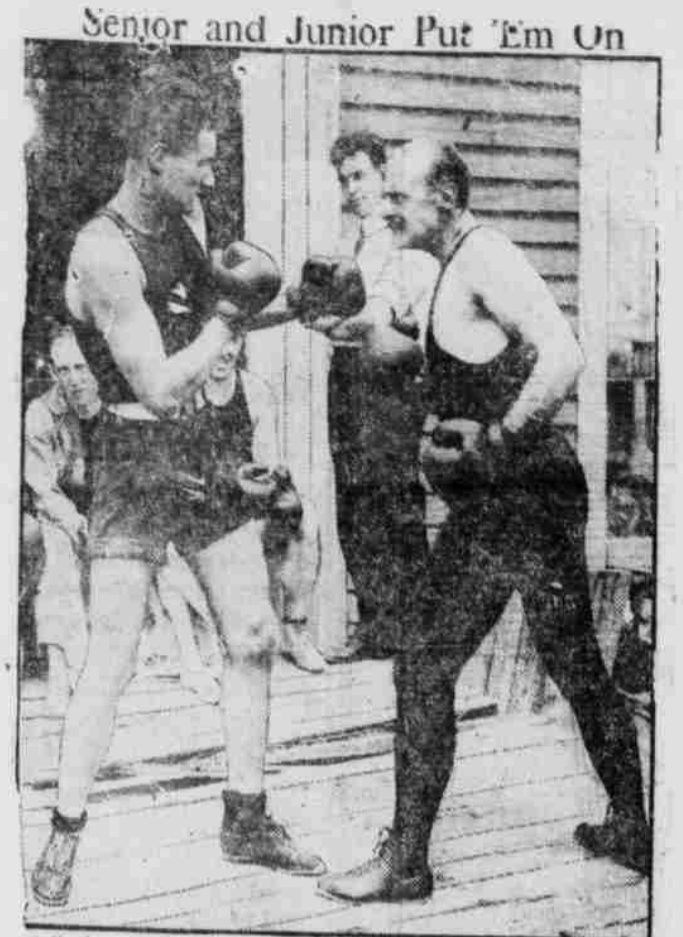
ERECTING RADIO TOWERS
 MOUNDSVILLE, Va., Dec. 23.—(U. P.)—Work of erecting huge radio towers on Langlin Field, the Government's aviation landing base here, has been started by D. T. Burton, a local contractor, to whom the contract for the work has just been awarded. The system is to be used for the purpose of communicating with the Government aviators while in flight across the Government route, giving them news of weather conditions and the like.

DECLARES RADIUM FAILURE
 LONDON, Dec. 23.—(U. P.)—"Radium is a failure. It is not only not effective as a remedy, it is dangerous, because its burning effect asstrates instead of cures disease. Many leading surgeons have discarded it in favor of X-Rays."
 This statement, which is reported to have been made by Sir Thomas Parkinson on his arrival in New Zealand from London, has fallen like a bombshell on scientific circles. Sir Thomas Parkinson is physician to the Prime Minister, and was formerly president of the Chelsea Clinical Society. Any pronouncement by him, therefore, is of great importance.

bound to attract attention in medical circles.
 "I am very surprised to hear such a blunt and definite statement," said Dr. Stanley Melville, chief radiologist at St. George's Hospital. "Radium is feeling its way, just like X-rays, and the two together hold out considerable hope in the treatment of cancer."
 "The word 'cure'—I wish to emphasize this point—is never permitted by expert radium or X-ray workers, and no honest claim to have effected cures by its agency have yet been made by those whose practical experience alone gives them authority to speak in the matter.
 "We cannot be positive at present, but within the next five years we may have proved something. In the meantime we can definitely assert that radium and X-rays have together robbed cancer of its most awful horrors and prolonged life. Sooner or later we may acquire the knowledge of what is a lethal dose to a cancer cell.
 "It is as ridiculous to assert that radium is dangerous as to hold out extravagant hopes, for the time being, of its curative properties."

IDLE BECOMING NIMRODS
 TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 23.—(U. P.)—The unemployment situation throughout Kansas has forced numerous idle men to adopt a Nimrod's life, to earn their living.
 More than 75,000 hunting licenses have been issued in the State this year, which is double the number issued last year, according to a recent announcement made by Alva Clapp, State Game Warden. In some counties six times as many hunting licenses have been issued this year as last, Clapp said.
