**WIFE OF PRESIDENT IS DECLARED GOOD MIXER**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Harding is the best "mixer" who ever presided as mistress of the White House, according to the oldest attachés there. They cannot recall a first lady who was so democratic.

Many visitors going through the East room and other public parts of the White House have been given an unexpected thrill by the sudden appearance of Mrs. Harding on the scene. She takes great delight in coming downstairs unexpectedly and dropping in on sightseers wandering curiously about.

Although they usually recognize her in advance, she always walks up and extending her hand announces that "I am Mrs. Harding and I'm glad to see you here."

She usually asks what State the visitor is from and many times they discover mutual acquaintances. There is nothing formal about these little meetings and if she is busy, she says so and goes on. If he has time, often she shows them through other rooms.

Despite the heavy drain on her energy, Mrs. Harding thoroughly enjoys her life in the White House. Her only difficulty is in adhering to the strict schedule which Dr. Sawyer insists upon. He calls every morning and watches her closely because in his years as the Harding family physician, he has learned that Mrs. Harding is too active for her own good, and his hardest job is to get her to take sufficient rest.

Mrs. Harding is fond of motoring and rides about Washington a great deal, much of the time alone. Twice a week she goes out to see Mrs. George H. Christian, Jr., wife of the president's secretary. They were next door neighbors in Marion and Mrs. Harding likes to get away from formalities and talk about the home folks in Marion.

present market is a "one-man market" and that in the present market is a large operator who in addition to being a buyer, is also an elevator warehouse man, a shipper, a manufacturer of grain food products, a miller and an exporter. It is time for the grain growers to get the real facts in the case.

**Investigation Now Asked.**

A resolution was introduced in congress on August 14 asking for an investigation which will bring those facts to light. The resolution was referred to the senate committee on agriculture. No action by that committee has been reported.

"Every grain grower should write to his congressman and senator and urge that Senate Resolution No. 133 be brought out of the committee, adopted and carried into effect. This resolution is broad enough to secure all the necessary facts. When we have secured official information, then we will be able to judge the merits of the grain exchange operators' contention that our low market prices are almost entirely due to lack of export buying."
