JURY SENDS 'BOOZE' BACK AS XMAS GIFT

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—It will be Merry Christmas in the home of Giuseppe Catalano for a jury in supreme court rendered a verdict which will result in Catalano receiving from the custodian of the police department enough wine, whiskey and brandy to tide the family through all periods of illness that may possibly lie ahead of it.

On April 22 patrolmen raided Catalano's cellar and took therefrom nine barrels of wine, a cask of whiskey and four bottles of brandy.
Taking the stand, Catalano explained that he had purchased the "booze" before the days of federal prohibition from a friend.
The jury decided in Catalano's favor and his barrels and bottles will be turned over to him.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 26.—(U. P.)—Canada's apple yield for 1921 is 3,337,200 barrels. The Dominion Fruit Commissioner's Department shows that British Columbia increased its production to 1,009,000 barrels, as compared with 504,540 barrels the previous year. The total value of the apple crop in all Canada is placed at \$30,000,000.

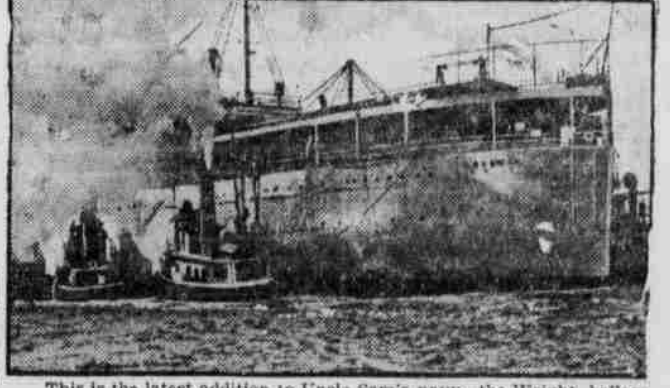
