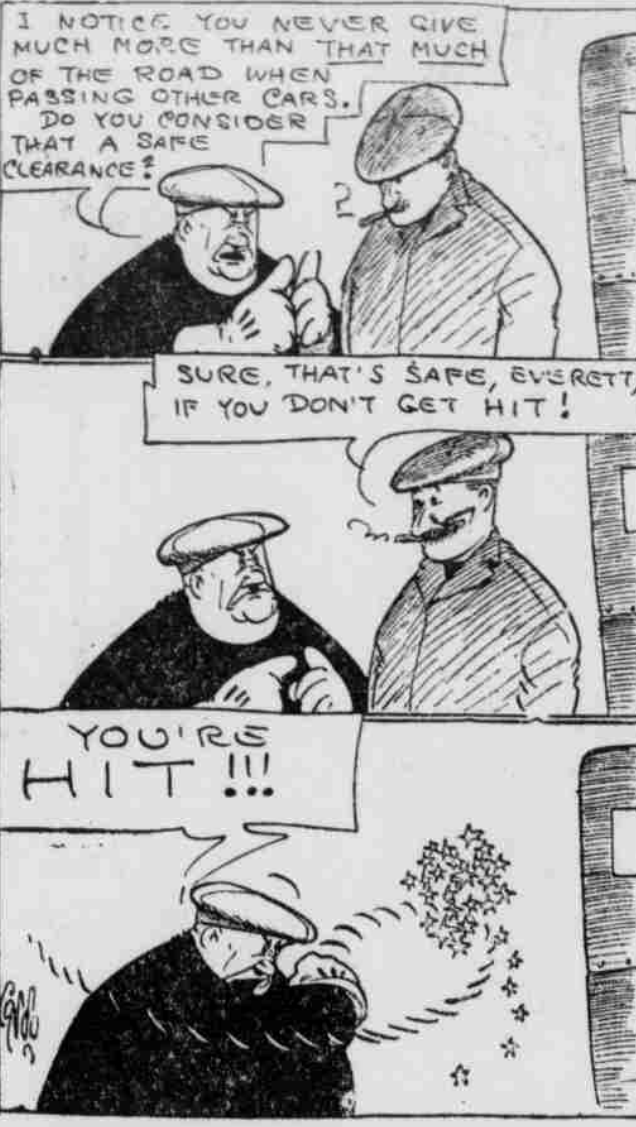

HAWAII WILL ASK FOR CONGRESS APPROPRIATION

HONOLULU, T. H., Dec. 26.—(U. N. S.)—The sum of \$3,000,000 needed to provide an adequate supply of irrigation water for the newly authorized Hawaiian rehabilitation project will be requested from Congress, according to a decision of the Hawaiian Homes Commission under Governor Farrington. Suitable lands on the Island of Molokai, only a small portion of which is now under cultivation, have been selected on which to try the experiment of rehabilitating the Hawaiian race through putting the people back onto the land. Irrigation water will be necessary to the proper development of these lands, members of the commission state, although dry farming methods may be experimented with as well. Regular instruction in scientific agricultural methods will be given to the Hawaiian settlers as a part of the rehabilitation scheme.

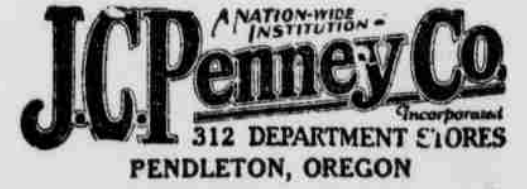
