HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES.

BUYING.
Buying in bulk is usually cheaper as we are not paying for the package, the work of the tacker, etc. This method saves time for the housekeeper and for the grocer, since one is not always buying the same product in small amounts. It is a convenience to the housekeeper to have a large amount of any kind of products on hand and to know that she will not constantly be finding that she is "out" of this or that. The bulk method is especially good for some kinds of food that can be obtained for much less money in bulk and are equal in quality to those found in package form. On the other hand it requires more care in buying by bulk than by package. The quality is good many times is inferior although not always. It is more apt to be contaminated by other foods, such as bulk oatmeal having a keener or moldy odor and taste. There is more chance for adulteration, since the package age must state the contents and there is usually more difficulty in getting an adjustment made in case of faulty products. The weight and measure may be short and many times there is much waste.—V. D.

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
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
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
