FRENCH NOW BELIEVE LANDRU WAS A CLEVER GERMAN SECRET AGENT

Theory That He Used Alleged Women Victims as Spies Now Gains Credence.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—(I. N. S.)—Did "Bluebeard" Landru actually assassinate and then burn the ten women and one boy who disappeared after making his acquaintance or was he only a German spy whose alleged victims were his accomplices and who are hiding away to escape French court martial.

This question has been raised again since the conviction of Landru on all eleven counts and despite the fact that he has been sentenced to the guillotine. It has gained wide credence since his attorney, the famous Moro-Glaffieri, in leaving Landru's cell, declared:

"Landru has made astonishing revelations to me. I cannot say what they were until the case comes up on appeal, but they are revelations that will create a sensation throughout the world."

The "spy" theory to account for the disappearance of ten of "Bluebeard's" fiancées was raised shortly after Landru's arrest. His mysterious coming and going at the villa at Gambais, where he is supposed to have killed most of his victims, had long led many of the Gambais villagers to believe that he was a German secret service agent. They even went so far as to declare that the smoke seen coming from Landru's chimney was a signal to German aircraft.

"Henri Javal, a criminal expert now asks the old question again and answers that, in his belief, Landru was a spy and not an assassin.

Javal reviews the history of "Bluebeard's" case and points out that the State produced scarcely a single iota of evidence to prove that he ever killed.

"His crime might be espionage. Suppose that Landru, during the course of the war, made it his business to recruit spies for the German Secret Service. As agents he would prefer women, who would be more easy to dominate. He would choose among several hundred. By preference he would engage those who had neither families nor friends, so that their absence would not prove astonishing.

"To receive them he had an isolated house, where he manufactured false papers. He kept the genuine which might be useful to him. He kept an exact resume of his operations, for he had to keep account of his services. When he was arrested he kept quiet—and they kept quiet.

"In this way the apparently unreasonable things efface themselves. The theory that Landru caused the bodies

to disappear and kept the papers in not conceivable; a birth certificate is easier to burn than a woman.

"In this way the inexplicable diary of Landru explains itself. This, finally, is explained in this affair of 'assassination' why no witness and no material evidence have revealed an explanation; therefore it is an affair of espionage."

Relatives and friends of Landru's missing fiancées vigorously combat the assertions. They point out that for the most part Landru's "victims" were women ill fitted to become spies.

ANOTHER SOLUTION OF THE SERVANT PROBLEM

LONDON, Jan. 2.—(I. N. S.)—The Girls' Friendly Society has decided that the servant problem lies in the wrong conception that it was a degrading occupation.

Lady Cowan told the society that England should follow the example of Denmark and Holland and have the last year of every girl's school life spent in domestic training.

"We ought to have a certificate of degree," said Lady Cowan, "carrying the same social value as the degrees of our girls of the Newham and Girton finishing schools."

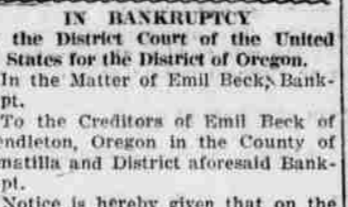
