STATE WINS VICTORY.
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—The state won the first tempo-

rary victory in the trial of Roscoe Arbuckle, charged with taking the life of Virginia Rappe, when Judge Louderback opened the court with a ruling denying the defense's plea that the entire testimony of Josephine Keasa, given at Arbuckle's first trial, be read into the record. Miss Meza was the chambermaid at the St. Francis hotel who testified to listening at the keyholes while Arbuckle's Labor Day party was in progress.

NEW GRAND JURY WILL START WORK MONDAY

At 9 o'clock Monday morning Umatilla county's new grand jury will be called in session to take up matters coming before it, including charges against District Attorney Keator, E. F. B. Riddgway, special prohibition officer and others. A representative from the attorney general's office will act as legal advisor to the grand jury and it is presumed he will arrive by Monday morning. Before entering upon their duties the grand jurors will be charged by Circuit Judge G. W. Phelps as to their duties under the law.
