RAG-PICKER MAY BE NAPOLEON'S DECENDENT

PARIS, Jan. 20.—(A. P.)—One of the rag and bone pickers of Paris has just made known his belief that he may be a descendant of the great Emperor Napoleon I. His name is Louis Napoleon Eugene Maximilia Laurent-Masson. He is called "Napoleon" and gives as the reason for his use of that name the following explanation:
 "My father was a shoe collar and secondhand dealer who used to rescue dogs' and cats' bodies from the Seine to sell for making grease. My mother was a traveling member of petri and pans.
 "My mother's mother was female de Mandel, of Spanish origin and noble. Her husband, my grandfather named Fernan, was from Ireland. They kept an inn at Clethy, in the department of Pas de Calais, where each changed horses.
 "One evening the emperor arrived at Clethy and my grandmother turned him to go, no further as there were English soldiers about. My grandfather fled and hid in a ravine. My grandmother hid Napoleon in the lower part of our two storied cellar until he could leave in safety. When my mother was born, my grandfather always refused to recognize her as his child, declaring that Napoleon was her father.
 "You will find a reference to Napoleon's stay in Clethy in Marshal Bertrand's Memoirs with some hints about the child that resulted from it.
 "That's why I am better known as Napoleon, and with reason."

SQUEAKS OF RATS AT ANNUAL DENTAL CLINIC

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—(I. N. S.)—The squeaks of rats and the grunts of guinea pigs will be heard at the annual clinic of the Chicago Dental Society, which will open a three-day session tomorrow.
 Dr. E. V. McCollom, of Johns Hopkins University, who has several thousand rats, pigs and other animals with which he has been experimenting, will bring to the clinic a large assortment of the pets so as to give a demonstration of diet and food values.
 The medical fraternity has evinced much interest in Dr. McCollom's experiments. He feeds one group of pigs on a strict diet for a few months, then changes and gives them entirely different food. On one diet they grow strong and alert and on the other feeble and dull.
 Dr. McCollom will plan three menus for the dental meeting, showing relative values of foods and the best combination of vegetables.

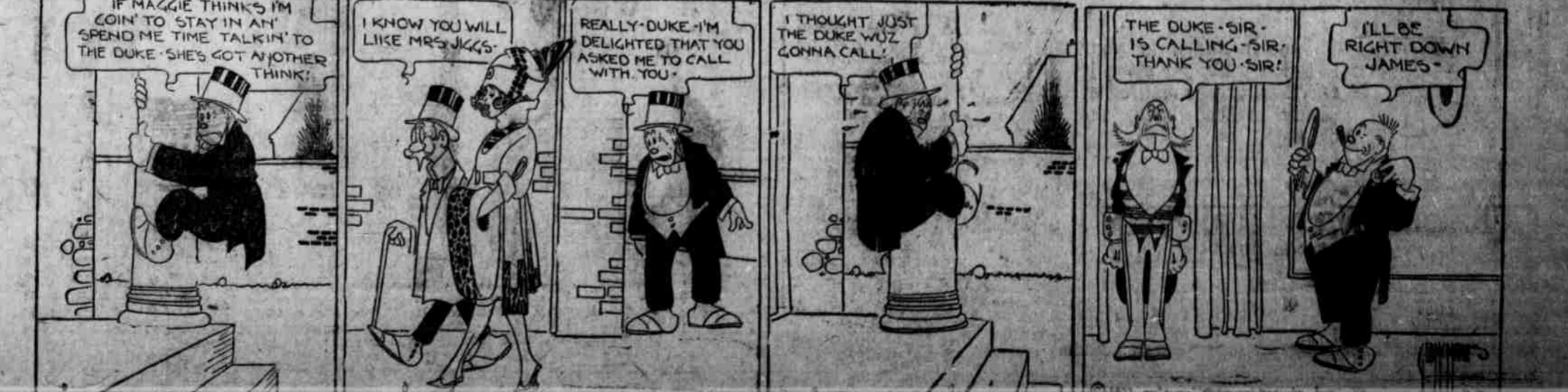
