HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

- Salad
- 6 apples
- 4 small sweet pickles
- 2 small onion
- Celery seed
- Boiled dressing
- Peel and dice apples, pickles and onions together, mix with celery seed and dressing.
- Serve with a meat dinner.
- Four and Peanut Salad
- Cut ripe pears into cubes, mix with mayonnaise dressing and cover with ground peanuts.
- Peaches or apricots can be used in place of pears.
- Fruit Salad
- Cut two tart apples into dice, slice two bananas and one orange into bits. Seed and cut one bunch of grapes in halves and mix altogether with 1-2 cup of broken nut meats and a salad dressing.—V. D.

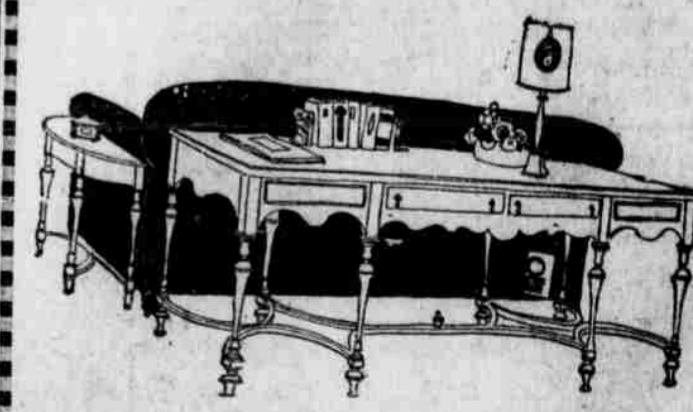

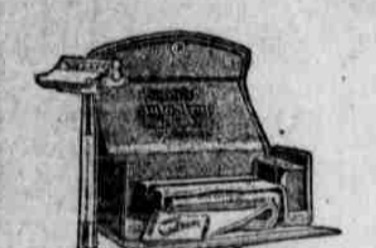
