Spray Controls Woolly Aphis Woolly aphis on fruit trees can best be controlled by spraying with a com-bination of lime-sulphur and miscible oil applied in late winter. Regular dormant strength lime-sulphur, 12 to 100, is used, to which is added 2 gatlons of heavy miscible oil to each 100 sallons of dilute spray. The oil should be diluted with an equal quantity of water, while agitated vigorously. The oil emulsion is then added slowly sto nearly full and while the water is well agitated. Choose a period of clear settled weather for the application of the
