FARMERS' CHAUTAUQUA IS SUCCESSFUL AFFAIR

(East Oregonian Special.) BOARDMAN, Ore., Feb. 13.—An interesting and profitable session of the Farmers Chautauqua concluded its work Saturday afternoon. From 30 to 100 farmers and their wives attended. Prof. Johnson of O. A. C. opened the institute Thursday p. m. with an exhaustive discussion of the local problems of irrigation and drainage. Friday morning Prof. Gunn presented comparative facts and figures covering the years 1918-1920 and three types of farms, dairy and diversified with conclusions somewhat against a farm given entirely to hay production. In the afternoon C. S. Brewster of Kerr, Gifford and Co., discussed poultry raising emphasizing proper motion, housing, feeding for increased production etc. Saturday Prof. Jameson and Prof. Bindgren of O. A. C. discussed respectively dairy and hog problems. During the two days, Friday and Saturday the work for the women was in charge of Miss Cooley of O. A. C., covering with an enthusiastic class, problems of clothing and nutrition.

Other special features of the occasion were community dinners on Friday and Saturday and exhibits of the vocational departments of the local schools. Local health inspection was continued last Wednesday when the county nurse arrived for a two days visit to the local schools. All the pupils were weighed and measured and special attention given to possible skin and throat infections. Recommendations are made directly to the parents and where necessary family visits are made.

The local city council met with the school board in an attempt to get the school district to continue the water service to the town of Boardman. The board, however, feels that the plant is taxed to capacity in supplying the need of the school and decided not to continue the service.

A. L. Mays of the state highway service has moved from Pendleton to Boardman and will develop a tract of land he owns west of town. Supt. M. B. Signs of the Boardman schools has notified the board that owing to other plans he will not be a candidate for re-election next month when the question of teachers for next year comes up for consideration. Mr. Signs has for three years been at the head of the schools during which time they have grown steadily in numbers and efficiency and it is generally conceded that this is the best year the schools have known.

The Boardman high school basketball team defeated Irigon the second time this season 12 to 15. It is planned to conclude the season with a game with Stanfield on the 17th and give attention to baseball after that date.

'JAZZ GOES BACK TO JUNGLE' SAYS PASTOR

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—(U. S. S.)—"Perhaps jazz is our nation's anthem, and if that is true then the devil's crying argument, 'Go to Hell,' is our national slogan," declared the Rev. Percy Siskway Grant, pastor of the Episcopal Church of the Ascension, in a sermon on the text: "Is Jazz Our National Anthem?"

Jazz goes back to the African jungle," the pastor said, "and its effect is to make you clatter, want to go on all fours and wish your tail around a tree. It is a savage crash and bang. It rings the bell for full steam astern."

"There is no pathos or idealism about jazz music," Dr. Grant continued. "It is for sensation. In the dance, instead of symbolism it becomes sensuality."

"Dancing is Substitute." "Dancing is itself a substitute for sexual contact. But when it becomes an instrument for a gratification, then the whole psychological process is turned about, and instead you have an injury. Then it becomes the gesture of the jungle."

"Plate said that whenever modes of music change morals change. Music changed greatly a few years ago. We have had storms of all kinds—international and interracial. Jazz cannot help closing our ideals, even our humanness."

The heroine in "Jazz" was described by the pastor as "the poor little rich wife trying to reform a sensual husband with good books, good music and other entertainment."

"The world of today is too much concerned with the dancing floor and not with the men under the floor who hold it up," said Dr. Grant. "The Church is the only remedy for this condition."

ELECTRIFY ITALY'S RAILROADS ROME, Feb. 13.—(U. P.)—Electrified railway lines in Italy will, in a few years, be completed to the extent of 6,000 kilometers, according to a program of electrification recently adopted and outlined in an official report. Work on the new program has already begun and a part of the lines will have been converted within the year. Completion of the program is calculated to save at least 2,500,000 tons of coal yearly.
