COCONA COOKIES

- 4 tablespoons shortening.
- 1 cup sugar.
- 1/4 cup milk.
- 1 egg.
- 2 cups flour.
- 3 teaspoons baking powder.
- 1/4 teaspoon salt.
- 1/2 cup cocoa.

Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk and beaten egg; mix well. Sift flour, baking powder, cocoa and salt together and add. Roll out 1/4 inch thick on floured board; cut with cookie cutter. Bake in hot oven about 12 minutes.—V. D.

TAX COMMITTEE TO BE HERE MARCH 15

An opportunity for taxpayers of Umatilla county to be of assistance in solving tax problems will be afforded March 15 when a committee on tax investigation, appointed by the governor, will be in Pendleton. County Judge I. M. Schanapp received a letter from the commission this morning in which a request was made that the use of the courtroom be secured for the hearing which will start at 10 o'clock in the morning.

The appearance in Pendleton of the special committee is only one of a number of appearances which will be made over the state. Pendleton is on the itinerary which includes Baker and La Grande in Eastern Oregon.

The suggestions secured by the committee on its journey will be incorporated in a report to be made to the governor, it is understood.
