HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

- 3-4 cup shortening.
- 2 cups sugar.
- 1-4 cup milk
- 2 EGGS.
- 1-4 teaspoon grated nutmeg.
- 1 teaspoon vanilla or grated
- ring of 1 lemon.
- 4 cups flour.
- 3 teaspoons baking powder.
- Cream shortening and sugar
- together; add milk to beaten
- eggs and beat again, add slowly
- to creamed shortening and su-
- gar; add flavoring; add 2 cups
- flour sifted with baking powder
- and nutmeg; add enough more
- flour to roll easily. Roll out
- very thin on floured board; cut
- with cookie cutter; sprinkle with
- sugar; put a raisin or a piece of
- walnut in the center of each.
- Bake about 12 minutes in hot
- oven.

- 3 ounces melted chocolate.
- 3 tablespoons cream.
- 1 egg.
- 3-4 cup powdered sugar.
- 1 tablespoon corn starch.
- 1-8 teaspoon salt.
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.

- cream to beaten egg; mix in
- powdered sugar gradually; add
- corn starch which has been
- mixed with a little cold water;
- cook in top of double boiler, stir-
- ring constantly until smooth
- and thick; add salt and vanilla.

ANOTHER VETERAN TO LEAVE CONGRESS

EAST ST. LOUIS, Ill., March 9.—(U. P.)—News of the proposed retirement from congress of Representative William A. Rodenberg at the expiration of his present term, March 4, 1932, struck like a bomb shell in Illinois political circles.

Rodenberg will have served as a representative for 29 years from the twenty-second congressional district when he steps out of national politics. In 1929, Rodenberg was re-elected by a plurality of 23,000.

The only members of the Illinois delegation, who are older in point of service than Rodenberg, are Representatives "Uncle Joe" Cannon and James K. Mann.

Edward E. Miller, state treasurer, has announced he would be a candidate to fill the shoes of Rodenberg.
