HOME DEMONSTRATION IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES

Meat.
Meat is valued largely for its protein, fat and mineral salts. It is also thought that meat has some stimulating action upon the body. Other food materials such as eggs, milk, dried beans and peas also supply the same nutrients. The use of milk should be considerably increased. Fruits and vegetables should be used freely with meat.

Scalloped Meat with Rice or Bread Crumbs.
2 cups chopped canned meat.
One or 2 cups soft stale bread crumbs or cooked rice.
One cup liquid from jar.
A little minced parsley, if desired, and a few drops of onion juice.
Mix the meat, crumble or rice, liquid and seasoning, adding salt and pepper if needed. Bake in an oiled dish until heated thru and browned on top.—V. D.
