**CORVALLIS, Ore., March 24.**—(U. familiar with Eastern Oregon conditions. His removal from office may be demanded if an investigation bears out suspicions held by local folk and by some Portlanders.

As announced today the federal position ignores entirely such important roads as The Dalles-California road and the Roosevelt Coast highway, nor is the Pendleton John Day road given any consideration whatever. Yet the million dollar Wallula cutoff is favored despite the fact that every Eastern Oregon legislator, with one exception, practically all the county courts and principal towns have strongly gone on record against the scheme.

The cutoff subject was discussed at a meeting at noon today of the special Commercial association committee, headed by Senator R. W. Ritner. It was the unanimous sentiment of the committee to continue the fight vigorously. W. L. Thompson, former member of the Oregon highway commission, attended the meeting.  
Unless the Oregon commission abandons its present attitude regarding the Wallula cutoff the federal recommendation will be of no avail as the project must be approved by the state commission before it can be built.

## DEVICE TESTED TO KEEP AEROPLANE STRAIGHT

**CARSON CITY, Nev., March 24.**—(U. P.)—A rigid test of a device to keep an airplane pilot flying straight, despite the height, or clouds, is being given a rigid test there by mail aviators. The device was invented by two Salt Lake men, D. G. Wright, and Herbert Marsh.

The device is composed of four small glass tubes filled with mercury, which close and break an electric circuit as the plane tips in the direction that causes the liquid to flow. The device is declared to be especially valuable to the pilot when he is too far above the earth to see or when a storm obscures his vision of the ground. It is at such times as these that the pilot loses his sense of balance and allows his plane to slip, crashing to earth, or starting on a death dive before he realizes what is happening. The least tip longitudinally of literally causes the mercury to flow to the end of the glass tube, closing the circuit, which lights a small electric lamp in the indicator face, which warns the pilot.

Claron Nelson, manager of the western division of the air mail service, has declared the device means a new era of safety in aviation.
