J. H Gwinn is a native of Illinois and ived in Idaho sefore coming to Pendleton 22 years ago. His father was the first Methodist missionary to the territory of Idaho, coming to that state in 1871. During his life in Idaho Mr. Gwinn was with a mercan-tile establishment for 11 years. de also held an important post in the Iduho legislature in 1895, being chief derk of the house of representatives and joint clerk of the house and sen-

Since 1960 Mr. Gwinn has been a continuous resident of Pendleton save for two years, 1905 and 1906, when he was located at Denver as the secretary of the National Livestock Asso.
