### JAMES H. GWINN

(Continued from page 1.)

Mr. Gwinn was chosen for second term as supreme representative and is now the supreme master at arms of the national organization.

J. H. Gwinn is a native of Illinois and lived in Idaho before coming to Pendleton 22 years ago. His father was the first Methodist missionary to the territory of Idaho, coming to that state in 1871. During his life in Idaho Mr. Gwinn was with a mercantile establishment for 11 years. He also held an important post in the Idaho legislature in 1895, being chief clerk of the house of representatives and joint clerk of the house and senate.

Since 1900 Mr. Gwinn has been a continuous resident of Pendleton save for two years, 1905 and 1906, when he was located at Denver as the secretary of the National Livestock Association.

In a story in the Oregon Journal this morning it was intimated Mr. Gwinn might enter the race against Sinnott. The following is from the Journal's story.

Congressman Sinnott has stirred up a lot of opposition to himself, outside of any federated societies program, by his recommendation of Tom Thompson for the postmastership of Pendleton. Thompson was the chairman of the congressional committee for the Second district and became a candidate for the postmastership after the last presidential and congressional election. The job was held by Lester Cronin a young republican of Pendleton, who had risen to the position through long service in the office and as a result of merit examination and consequent appointment. He also stood as high man in the last examination prior to the appointment of Thompson.
